

Dicken Receives Initial Release Of New Book

S. N. Dicken, head of the department of geology and geography, received the initial release yesterday of his new book "A Regional Economic Geography."

A study of production by regions is presented by the book. It gives comparisons and contrasts of crop productions, manufacturing and trade throughout the world.

Dr. Dicken plans to use the new book in an economic geography course at sophomore level next fall. At present this course is at upper-division level.

The 516-page book contains 262 illustrations and was published by D. C. Heath and Company, Boston. It is bound in a rust-colored jacket with gold-stamping. Its size is 8x11.

The book was started before the war, but was interrupted by Dr. Dicken's service as a consultant in geography for the Army Air Forces and as a member of the faculty of Biarritz university in France.

Music Recital Tonight at 8

How Do People on Palau Live?

"Palauan Society," a book by H. G. Barnett, associate professor of anthropology, was released the first day of May by the University of Oregon Press.

The 223-page book gives a description of the social life of the people of the Palau Islands. These islands are in the Micronesian area, which is now being administered by the U. S. Navy and was formerly under the control of Japan.

The publication is a result of Dr. Barnett's visit to the Palauan group during 1947-48. He was sent out by the Navy to study the customs of the people there. The information gained will be used both by the Navy and by students of anthropology.

Various phases of the book deal with the natives' social life, marriage, religion, economy and politics. Dr. Barnett also plans to write an analysis of the changes that have taken place in their culture as

a result of contacts with the Japanese, Americans, Germans and other outsiders.

Copies of "Palauan Society" have been sent to the Navy, libraries, and interested individuals.

ed start the American Veterans committee that year.

Wrote Best Seller

In 1946 Meyer, who is now only 29 years old, received a Harvard fellowship and wrote his best-selling book, "Peace or Anarchy."

This will be Meyer's first speech in Eugene, although he spoke in Portland last year to the City Club, advocating world peace through a world government. The purpose of UWF, according to Meyer, is to strengthen the United Nations through means already provided by the charter.

Meyer wants the United States to ask the other members of the U. N. to convene and discuss charter amendments which would change the existing organization into a limited federal world government.

"Let's put it up to Russia," Meyer says, "We can't know if she will

refuse to join a federal world government until we ask her."

The Federalists, through Meyer, are advocating a dual foreign policy for the United States—a practical program toward a limited world government along with a strong defense policy.
