

Lemon-and-Green Prepares for Final Two Weeks of Spring Grid Practices

With only two weeks by the calendar, seven actual practice days of spring football left, Oregon's Webfoots are buckling down for the stretch run which will be culminated by the annual intrasquad game May 28.

JIM AIKEN ran his charges through another heavy drill yesterday and plans to do the same this afternoon.

Lone major casualty of the workout was Tackle Steve Dotur, who injured his knee and was forced to leave the field.

At present the boys are trying to perfect some plays given them by Aiken. Next year's offense, of necessity, will have to depend more on a running game than it

did in 1948, and consequently the whole scheme of attack will be slightly altered.

SOME of the newer plays call for a wide-open style of football and also call for the quarterback to do a smattering of running.

Here is how the squad shapes up at the moment:

Ends: Bob Anderson and Darrell Robinson have the first string berths nailed to the mast. Lou Robinson, Hale Paxton, Les Hagen and Nick Stevenson are also running strong.

Tackles: It's Dotur, Bob Roberts, Sam Nevills, and Gus Knickerehm far ahead of everyone else.

Guards: Ed Chrobot and Chet

Daniels are tops with a big scramble for the other posts. Jerry Moshofsky looks good.

Center: Dave Gibson is offensive pivot and Dick Patrick, defensive. Dick Gaudin is being given a crack at this job, too.

Quarterbacks: Jim Calderwood rates first at the moment, followed in order by Earl Stelle and Joe Tom.

Halfbacks: George Bell and either Woodley Lewis or John McKay will be back on first string. Chuck Missfeldt is slated for second string.

Fullback: Bob Sanders will do ball carrying and Dewayne Johnson the line backing. Number three man in Bud Boqua.

PULLMAN, Wash., May 16— (AP) — Washington State College scored a 2 to 1 victory over the University of Washington today to grab a one-game lead at the top of the Northern Division, Pacific Coast conference baseball league.

THE WINNING HURLER, Ward Rocky, held the Huskies to only four hits as he struck out 12 and walked four to take his fourth straight game in conference play.

WSC moved up from behind to tie the score in the seventh inning. Tom Marier scored the winning run on a single by Gene Camp.

The game was runies until the sixth frame when K. Chorlton singled to left field for Washington and scored on a hit-run single by Hete Heyamoto.

WSC's FIRST run was on a single by Pinch Hitter Frank Watson. He advanced to second on a home throw and made it to the home plate when Bobby McGuire singled to center. Washington's loss was charged up to Hal Arnason, who struck out six and walked one.

The two teams play again tomorrow when Dick Stiles will pitch for WSC and Washington will choose between Bob Moen and Mac Soriano to start tossing.

The Cougar win puts WSC one full game ahead of the second place Oregon Ducks.

Oregon Needs Series Sweep Thinclads Point for ND Meet

Championships Set For Seattle Oval; 'O' Captures Dual

Performing before the largest crowd ever to watch a Northern Division track meet on Hayward field, Oregon's Webfoot harriers edged out the Oregon State Beavers 66-65 to wind up the current season firmly lodged in second place in ND standings. Saturday the Ducks participate in the division championships at Seattle.

Coach Bill Bowerman's outfit cinched the victory by grabbing eight first places, and tying for another, as well as getting five seconds, and seven thirds. The Beavers made it a battle all the way as they captured five firsts, tying one, and added eight seconds, and seven thirds, besides the relay for their 65-point total.

IT WAS Bowerman's masterful juggling of personnel that won the meet for the Ducks. The Webfoot boss pulled away Davey Henthorne from the 100-yard dash to wrestle the blue ribbon spot from the Beavers in the 440.

Then came the surprise of the afternoon when Bowerman entered Woodley Lewis, Oregon ace broad jumper-sprinter, in the high-jump against Northern Division king, Ken Elliott. Lewis turned the surprise into a shock by tying Elliott for first with a leap of 6 feet 2 inches.

Lewis added a victory in broad jump and a third place in the century to share high point honors with Sprinter Albie Bullier, who won the 100 and the 220 for the Ducks.

LONG-STRIDING Walt McClure, Oregon's rapidly developing middle distance man, was the only record breaker of the afternoon. He burned up the cinders in the 880 in 1:55.7 to shave one-tenth of a second off the mark set by Kirman Storli of Oregon in 1940.

The Ducks' Big Three, George Rasmussen, Don Pickens, and Lloyd Hickok, kept their exalted position as the leading vaulters in the ND as they swept the event with Ras leaping 14 feet for first while Pickens and Hickok racked up 13 feet 6 inches and 12 feet 6 inches respectively.

JACK DOYLE, Bowerman's ace hurdler, also came up with some clutch points as he romped home first in the highs and second in the

Sid Milligan's Oregon golfers went down to their first Northern Division loss of the campaign Saturday in Seattle as the succumbed to Washington 18½ to 8½.

The Ducks go to Moscow, Idaho, for the ND championships this weekend.

Webfoot John Eckstrom fired a sizzling 68 but it wasn't good enough. He was shooting against Jim Mallory, the Huskie's number one man, who himself was having quite an afternoon.

The latter battered par for a 65 to capture three points and pace his mates to the win.

Beavers Block Way; Kirschmen Downed 15-7 on Saturday

Ralph Coleman's pesky Oregon State Beavers virtually knocked the proprs from under Oregon's ND title hopes Saturday by hammering out a 15-7 victory at Corvallis in the second game of a four-tilt series between the two clubs. The remaining pair are slated for this weekend when the Ducks travel there Friday and play at home Saturday.

THE DEFEAT dropped the Ducks into second place in division standings, leaving the way open for Washington State to sweep to the crown. Even if Don Kirsch and his scrappers manage to scuddle OSC twice this week, chances are it won't do them much good.

Buck Bailey's Cougars now have three games left, one against Washington and a set against an Idaho nine that has the rather unenviable record of one victory in 14 starts.

Thus WSC needs to take only two of the remaining three games to cinch the ND championship.

Oregon got off to a shaky start Saturday, but rallied and for a few brief moments it appeared they might win—and handily, too.

WEBFOOT Sid Mills yielded two runs in the first and then settled down to pitch shutout ball until the fatal sixth.

The Ducks, meanwhile, had deadlocked matters with a two-run outburst in the third. Johnny Kovenz's double, singles by Hal Zurcher and Al Cohen, plus Dick Bartle's fielder's choice accounted for that.
