Theta Scholarship

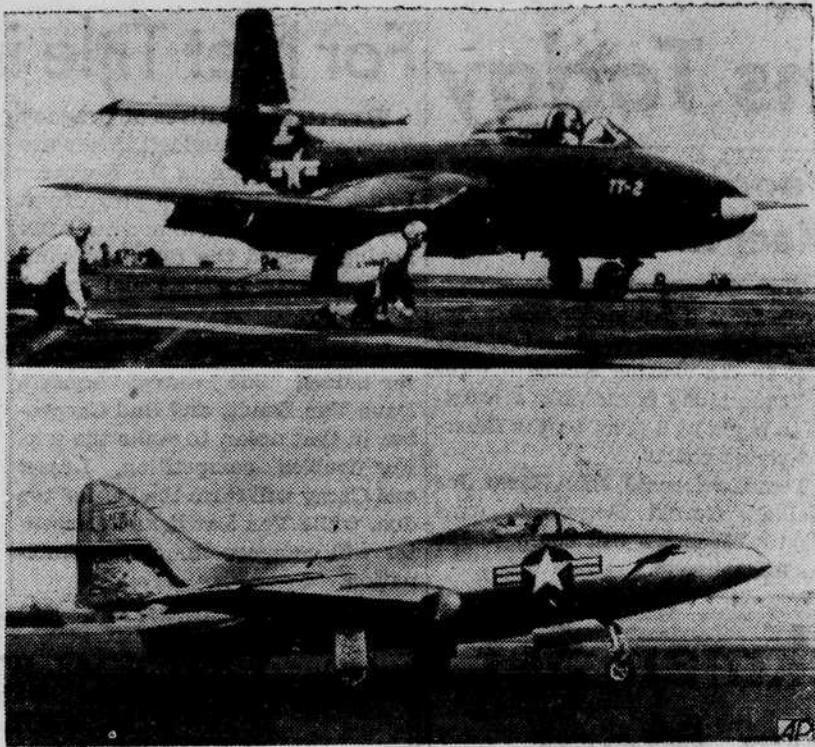

The winning teams will compete in the finals of the arguments next fall. Finalist winners will be presented with a set of "Oregon Compiled Laws Annotated," donated by Koerner, Young, Swett and McCulloch, law firm of Portland.

Presiding justice Wednesday when the opinion of the cases was rendered was Carl Griffith, second-year student. In the millrace question of Carrol vs. Kik, the justices were unanimous in deciding that it was proper to restore the race. Curtis Cutsforth, associate justice read the opinion.

In the other case, the surveyor

was held liable for the division of the property by Windsor Calkins, chief justice and Sam Hughes, associate justice. Charles Foster, associate justice, dissented. Foster read the opinion.

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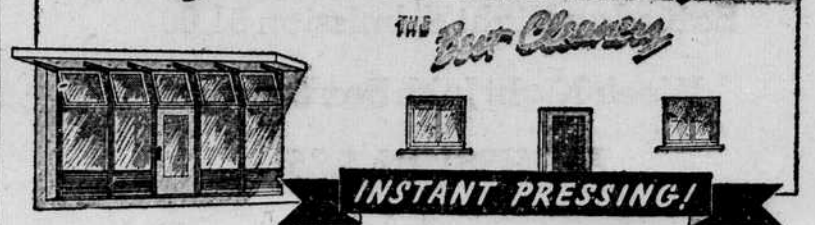
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
