Geology Men Will Attend Summer Camp

Sixteen upper-division and graduate students in geology will take part in the six-week geology summer camp beginning June 22, it has been announced by Professors L. W. Staples and E. M. Baldwin, who will direct the camp.

First half of the camp, the first to be held for a number of years, will be spent at the Horse Heaven mine near Ashwood, Oregon. Dr. Staples, who will direct the camp there, said this will give an opportunity to study geology in a volcanic region and mining geology at the Horse Heaven mercury mine. A trip will also be made to the John Day fossil beds.

Headquarters will be at the marine biology station at Coos Bay the last three weeks. Here a study will be conducted of the sedimentary formations along the coast with Dr. Baldwin in charge.

University credit will be given for this summer work.
