

Verdict Goes To Defendant In Moot Case

James Schiller, third-year law student, was held not responsible last night in the law school moot trials for injuries suffered by Ralph Johnson, a classmate of Schiller's, in a wreck involving Schiller's and another car February 25.

Johnson had asked \$10,000 specific and \$5,000 general damages of Schiller, plus \$892.78 in hospital and doctor bills. He suffered a fractured skull and a broken thigh in the accident, and charged that the injuries had permanently impaired his physical and mental health.

The crash occurred when Schiller's car and one driven by Rev. Roger L. Dick, The Dalles, met head-on soon after Schiller had met Johnson on the University campus and had ordered him a ride to his west Eugene home.

Johnson contended that Schiller was driving negligently at the time of the accident, and had swerved into the right-hand lane, directly in the path of Reverend Dick's car. Dick backed up Johnson's claims on the witness stand.

Schiller said that it was the Dick vehicle that swerved in his path. His statements were corroborated by Frank Bosch, patrolman with Eugene police force, and William Cramer, third-year law student.

A jury of eight men and four women from the University returned with the verdict in less than ten minutes.

Serving as attorneys for the plaintiff were Ed Allen, Carl Brophy, and Oglesby Young. Defense attorneys were James Richmond and Walter Rodman.

Bailiff-notary was Richard Carney; clerk, Harold Johnson; and reporter-sheriff, Fritz Giesecke.

Modern Buildings to Provide Conveniences for UO Students

Many more conveniences will be available to students when such buildings as the student union, library addition, drama theater, and the new women's dormitory are completed.

A handy place for a cup of coffee between classes will be provided by the student union, which is expected to be completed by March 1950.

There will also be, besides many recreational facilities, a large dance floor, post office, barber shop, several lounges, and numerous other items.

The number of students that can be accommodated in the library will be increased from approximately 700 to about 1300, when the new library addition is completed next year.

Study tables will also be available in the stacks, which will be open to everyone. It is rare for students to have "stack privileges" in a school of this size, according to Librarian C. W. Hintz.

Air-conditioning and fluorescent lighting will also be featured in the addition.

"Utter comfort for patrons" will be provided by the new University theater, Horace W. Robinson of the speech and drama department, said. Seating for about 400 persons in seats that are wider than usual, a five-inch difference in height between rows, and all of the latest technical equipment will furnish greater comfort for those viewing the performances.

The new women's dormitory will have a library, a completely equipped laundry on each floor, wardrobe closets, and kitchenttes for snacks.

The large, well-lighted dining hall can also be converted into a dance floor for house dances.

BUT for Nourse, Chandler might never have tried to throw the iron ball. His heave of 56 feet plus is the best on the west coast this year, almost three feet better than the conference record set last year by Southern California's Bill Sayless and six feet beyond the best toss by his tutor.

Chandler was high jumper and runner before entering Stanford.

He was watching Nourse push out the heavy ball during practice one day and let himself be talked into giving it a try.

A third Stanford man will give him an argument for the title and the record Saturday.
