

Green-White Tilt Today at 2

Trackmen in Seattle For PCC Title Meet

Trojans Picked; Many Records Expected to Fall

A galaxy of star performers will highlight the 19th Pacific Coast Conference track meet today in Seattle with 11 of the 1948 champions on hand to defend their titles.

BOB CHAMBERS of Southern California in the 880; Craig Dixon, UCLA, in the hurdles; Gay Bryan, Stanford, in the broad jump; John Montgomery, Trojans, in the pole vault, and Taylor Lewis, UCLA, in the discus are expected to retain their crowns.

HOWEVER, Don Anderson, California, in the sprints; Lou Robinson, Oregon, in the javelin; Bill Bayless, SC, in the shot, and Bob Selfridge of WSC figure to lose their coast laurels according to the pre-meet dopesters.

Coach **Bill Bowerman's** main hope for coast recognition lay in the vaulting prowess of Lanky George Rasmussen and the sprinting of Piston-Legged Davey Henthorne.

Although both men are ranked behind the strong Southern Division entrants, John Montgomery and Mel Patton, respectively, the margin of difference is very slight, particularly in the pole vault.

RASMUSSEN'S top vault this spring is 14 feet 6 inches, just 1 1/4 inches under that of the Trojan aerialist.

Henthorne will have the roughest assignment of the afternoon when he toes the mark against the world's fastest human, Patton. The little Webfoot speed merchant may press Patton to new mark, but can hardly be expected to upset him.

Seven olympic games competitors are entered in the PCC meet. Patton won two Olympic gold medals by finishing first in the 200 meter dash and by being on the winning 400 meter relay team.

HIS teammate Chambers finished sixth in the 800 meter run at London. George Stanich of UCLA took third in the high jump while his Bruin mate Dixon was third in the high hurdles.

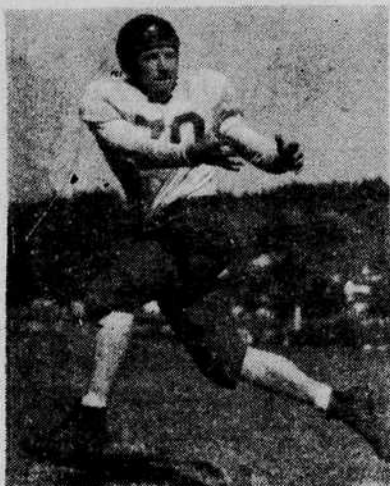
Leo Roininen and **Bill Parnell** of Washington State were members of the Canadian Olympic team, but failed to place in their events.

Kaare Vefling of California ran for his native Norway, but was eliminated in the semi-finals of the 1500 meter run.

SIDELINE interest of the contestants at the meet is the possibility of being selected to be on the all-coast team in its dual meet with the Big Nine Conference at Berkeley, June 21. The first three finishers in each event except the javelin will be chosen to represent the PCC.

Since the Big Nine schools don't throw the javelin, that event is not on the dual meet program. However, the 440 yard, one mile, and the 480 yard shuttle hurdle relays are included in that meet and men to fill those events will also be chosen from the competitors at Seattle.

The selections will be made by the coaches after the meet Saturday.

Drills, Clinic Both Wind Up With Squad Tilt

Family ties will be forgotten today, and the harmony evident on the practice field during the past couple of months will go up in smoke.

For this afternoon at 2 o'clock on Hayward Field the Greens and the Whites go at it in Oregon's annual intra-squad game that comes as a climax to the Spring Football Clinic now in progress.

HEAD COACH Jim Aiken has divided the squad into two units, with the Whites, composed of the first and fourth teams, being manned by 36 hefty pigskinners and the Greens—the second and third stringers—being made up of 39 players.

From all indications this will be a knockdown, dragout ball game in the fullest sense of the word. While the Whites, theoretically at least, have the bulge on offense, the defensive edge goes to the Green.

Plans call for each squad to use the platoon system, at least for the first half anyway.

THIS MEANS that while the game should be pretty much of a see-saw affair during the first two quarters, it will be the Whites who'll do most of the sawing in the last half, is they choose to employ their starting eleven.

The clambake goes, in effect, pit what Aiken hopes to be Oregon's "irresistible force" next year against its "immovable object." In other words, it constitutes a battle between the top offensive and defensive outfit.

Jim Calderwood, flashy graduate from the frosh squad, will guide the fortunes of the Whites, assisted in the backfield by John McKay, George Bell and Bob Sanders. In front of them will be the Ducks' number one line.

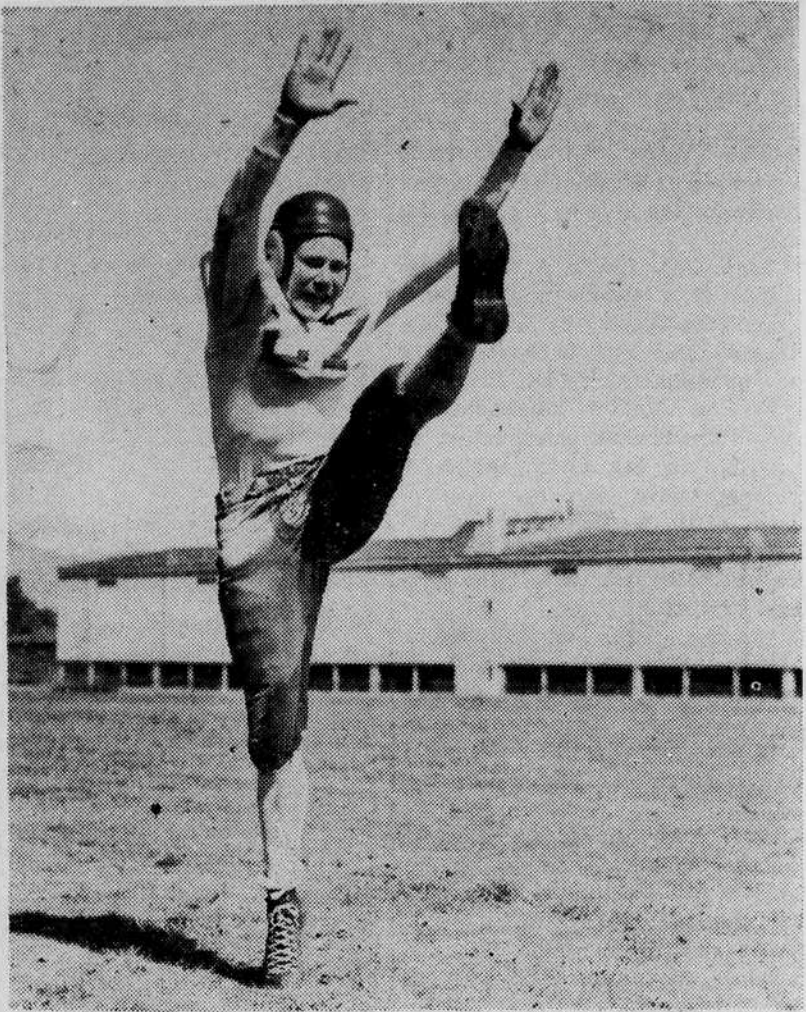
FOR THE Greens, Earl Stelle will do the offensive quarterbacking, with Chuck Missfeldt and Hal Cuffel at the halves and Dewayne Johnson at fullback.

Steve Dotur, whose knee was recently asperated, as well as **Woodley Lewis** and **Lou Robinson** will not take part in the squabble. The latter pair are at Seattle for the PCC championship track meet.

This afternoon's game will be under regular conditions—and with all the trimmings. PCC officials will work, while Mayor Ed Johnson of Eugene will preside as honorary referee. Then there will be a band together with half time entertainment in the form of an air show.

THE GREEN-WHITE tilt serves as the topper of the two-day clinic which got underway yesterday. Today's schedule calls for lectures on training methods and equipment, defensive football, and a showing of the movies containing highlights of the 1948 Duck season.

Lunch at John Straub hall will be the final appetizer for the day's big offering—the one in which family ties are forgotten and harmony goes up in smoke.
