Sale and removal of houses on the sites of the unfinished Erb Memorial building and the new women's dormitory is underway by University officials.

Three houses, owned by the University and formerly rented at 1443 and 1461 E. 14th and 1392 Beech Street went on sale Sept. 21.

The Hagar Apartments, seven buildings located at 1370 Beech street, have already been sold and will be removed from their present locations by November.

It is the plan of the University officials to sell all land, which is delaying the completion of Uni-versity buildings, by the end of November, so the school will not have the expense of having the structures torn down.
