The station first saw the light of day during April of last year

when Glenn Starlin, then head of the radio division of the speech department, announced that the University had obtained permission to operate a local radio station. The one obstacle was a ruling of the Federal Communications Commission, which stated that the range of the Duck's quack could not exceed the limits of the University.

MANY RESTRICTIONS

Effects of the ruling were felt in early May when the first trial broadcasts went to the air. After much borrowing, improvising, and nursing of their pittance of a budget, the staff was dissappointed to find that the voice of their brainchild was cutting in on the programs of Eugene stations. A hasty clamp was put on KDUK publicity and the construction crew went back to work again.

Finally in mid-May KDUK quacked. A month long news censorship was lifted, and reams of publicity announced the station's

Finally the big day came. At

noon radios all around the campus were eagerly snapped on, and ears were proposed against speakers, straining for the first sounds. row there was static.

"QUACK" TURNED TO "PEEP"

Only keen-eared listeners perched close to their sets in the vets dorms and John Straub caught the first noises from Villard Hall. The first "quack" was nothing more

Organizationally, there nothing wrong with KDUK. The services of the best undergraduate radio talent had been enlisted to prepare the 5-day-a-week, 12-1, 7-11 p.m. schedule. There was plenty of popular music, classics, musical comedy hits and study music. There was a news roundup, a five minute nightly sportscast, and plenty of sprightly chatter.

The only trouble was, unless you were able to get to a radio in John Straub or the Vets Dorms, all that talent was doing you no good. The best you could get were the old words that hitherto had been reserved for adherents of the Brooklyn baseball club, "wait till next year."

Fall of 1949 saw a new group entrusted with the headaches and cares of the radio division's littlest Duckling. Gone from the scene were the faculty advisers of KD-UK, Glenn Starlin and Bob Davey. Many pioneers of the dark days of April and May were gone from the University or washed their hands of the whole affair.
