Wesley Foundation, Methodist student organization, will present a six-weeks series of discussion programs called the "University of Life," beginning this Sunday from 6:30 to 7:25 p.m.

Featured in the series will be two discussion groups operating simultaneously, "Religion in Music" and "World Christian Community."

Objectives of the course "Religion in Music" are to discover how great religious themes and moods are portrayed through music, and how Catholic, Jewish, and Protestant faiths use music in their religious services.

Leading the music series this Sunday evening will be Dale Cooley choirmaster of the Catholic Church

in Eugene, who will describe the Catholic Mass and the use of music in the Catholic Church.

Other leaders in the six weeks series will include Dean Theodore Kratt and Professor Don Alton of the School of Music.

Jim Bryant of Friendly House will be guest leader in the course "World Christian Community." Objectives will be to discover the problems and great social, economic and religious issues in our country and others, and how Christianity is facing these crises.

MAJOR ISSUES

Bryant will conduct a discussion concerning the major issues that face a world seeking peace and mutual understanding. Other leaders in this course will include a number of foreign students, and members of the Political Science Department.

Students are invited to choose one of the two courses for the six weeks.

Each Sunday evening a buffet supper will be served at 5:15, a Chapel service will be presented at 6:00, and the discussion groups will be held from 6:30 until 7:25 p.m.
