

# Civil Service Exam Applications Due for Seniors Interested in Professional, Managerial Positions

Applications for examinations for Junior Professional and Management Assistant positions with the United States Civil Service Commission are due Nov. 8, with the examination given subsequent to that date, Karl W. Onthank, director of the graduate placement service, announced Wednesday.

Senior students, both men and women, are eligible, and any who have any idea of entering civil service either in professional or CAF categories should take this examination without fail, Onthank stated.

### FORMS AVAILABLE

Application forms may be procured at the Graduate Placement Office in Emerald Hall. The detailed announcement and sample examination questions may also be found in this office.

The examination will not be given again until the fall of 1950, and

unless it has been taken and passed a person is not eligible for government appointment at graduation.

### SPRING IS TOO LATE

"Every spring we have a number of students interested in government employment who find themselves ineligible because they failed to take this examination in the fall," Onthank warned.

Positions to be filled are trainee positions in which young people may begin a career in the Federal service in a variety of professions. Students need not have specialized in technical fields in school to qualify, as the examination is general in nature. In special divisions there are additional tests given.

### POSITIONS LISTED

Graduates are needed in the following positions: architect, astronomer, bacteriologist, economist,

food and drug inspector, geographer, geophysicist, landscape architect, legal assistant, mathematician, physiologist, psychologist, social science analyst, statistician, textile technologist, and junior management assistant.

Starting salaries of \$2,974 a year are customary for those entering the Federal service through these examinations.

Seniors are urged to take this examination not only because it is necessary to get on a federal register in the numerous categories listed, but also because having passed is an excellent recommendation for many positions in business and industry outside of the Service.

Appointment to Federal government offices in Washington, D. C. have also been selected by the National Institute of Public Affairs from those who have passed this examination.

## Panama Student Studies on Caupus

Miss Aida Ferrari of Panama is enrolled in the University for graduate study in the field of business administration and economics under a United States government fellowship.

Approximately 75 students are studying in the United States under this program, which has been in effect since 1941. It authorizes grants to Latin-American graduate students for study and research in the United States. The plan also provides for grants to United States students for further study in Latin-American countries.

Miss Ferrari received a degree in social science and economics from the University of Panama in 1948. Since that time she has worked as secretary for a government agency and has taught commercial subjects in high school.

## New Regulation For GI Students Slated by VA

A new regulation has been issued by the Regional Office of the Veterans Administration requiring prior approval for the issue of books and supplies for students registered in research or thesis.

Any student who wishes to avail himself of the GI Bill should place application immediately in the office of the registrar in Emerald Hall, James D. Kline, assistant registrar, announced Wednesday.

Students in research and thesis courses will be required to wait until applications are sent to the Veterans office in Portland, approved, and returned to the University before supplies may be obtained.

Kline emphasized that this regulation does not affect books and supplies for most students, including those in reading and conference courses. Students who have made application for reading and conference supplies may obtain immediate clearance in accordance with the latest interpretation of the GI directive.
