

Pacific Island Authority Slates Condon Lectures in November

Dr. Felix M. Keesing, executive head of the department of sociology and anthropology at Stanford University, will give the Condon lectures this year, Dr. L. S. Cressman, chairman of the lectureship, announced Friday.

Dr. Keesing has been a U. S. representative on the South Pacific commission since 1948. His talks on "Pacific Island Peoples in the Post-War World" will be given on Nov. 1 and 3.

He has had an outstanding background in the Pacific area. Born in Penang, Straits Settlements, his early education was received in

Auckland, N. Z.

After attending the University of Auckland, he became a fellow of the Rockefeller Foundation at Yale and University of Chicago in this country. Later he did advance research at the London School of Economics.

He received a doctor of literature degree from the University of New Zealand in 1933. Since then he has published a number of volumes on the Pacific people, including "The South Seas in the Modern World."

The Condon lectureship was created to bring to the state results of scientific research and study.

The attending physician said the mother was doing well and the babies had an excellent chance for survival. Their weights ranged from three pounds, three ounces, to three pounds, seven ounces.

Dr. John McDonald said he delivered the first child at 7:55 a.m. and the fourth 17 minutes later. He said he had warned Mrs. Hargraves to expect a multiple birth but was as surprised as the parents over the quadruplets. The Hargraves have two other children.

The astonished father said Dr. MacDonald broke the news to him by saying, "see here, Mr. Hargraves."

Dean Morris Speaks at Installation, Stresses Students' Social Debts

"Educated students are heavily in debt," maintained Victor P. Morris, dean of business administration, Thursday night before members of Phi Chi Theta, business womens' honorary, at their annual installation of officers.

In a discussion of the student's debt to the public, Dr. Morris pointed out that much of the educational process at the University is at the public's expense, giving students a measure of responsibility to the public.

"Education, in the truest sense, involves the development of student capacities," Morris stated. With capacity or ability there is a definite responsibility for using

it, he said.

Emphasizing the social responsibility of those in the business world, Morris believes that business has too long neglected its debt to social welfare.

Morris' address followed the installation and banquet dinner. Officers installed were Johanne Wong, president; Dorothy Thompson, vice president; Betty Horand, secretary; and Suzanne Michel, treasurer.

Wallace P. Carson, president of the Board of Governors of the Oregon State Bar, spoke before members of the Law School student body and faculty Friday afternoon.
