

Ducks Rout Colorado, 42-14

Lewis Repeats UCLA Feature; Runs 102 Yards

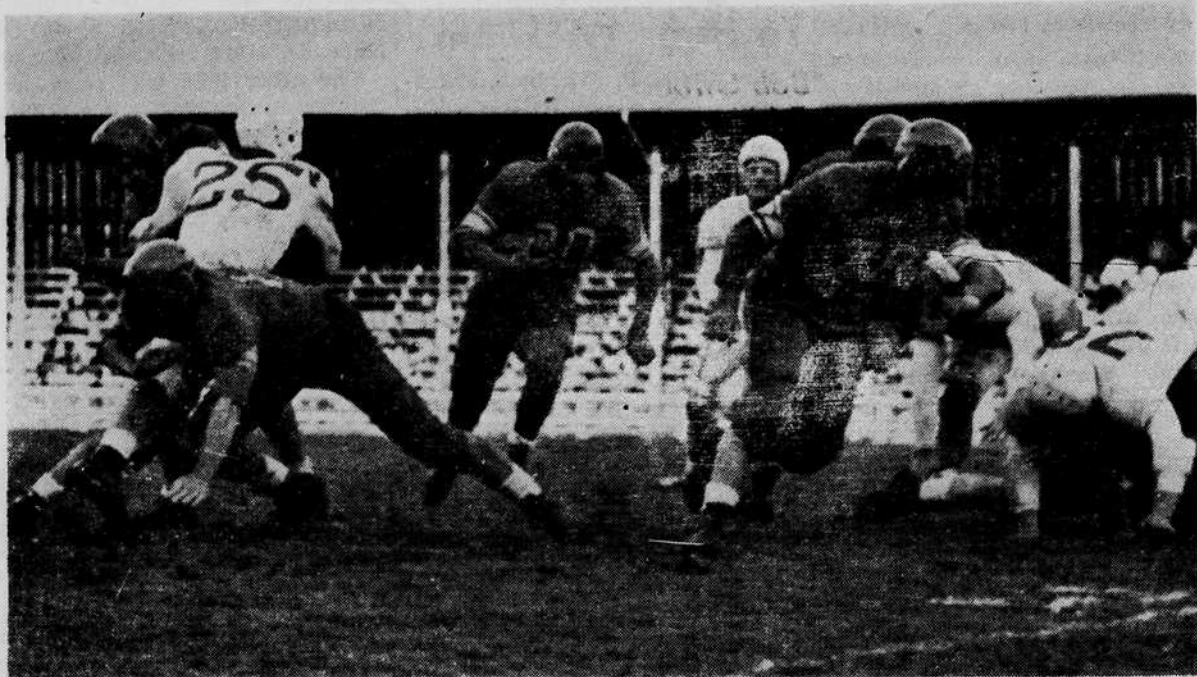

The Notre Dame of the Northwest, better known as the University of Oregon, swept to its fourth triumph in five starts this season, ringing up a smooth-as-velvet 42-14 win over the University of Colorado.

Although the Webfoot score against the Buffaloes was the highest ever run up on intersectional opposition by a Northwest football team, it was also the first time since 1932 that Oregon has defeated a squad based East of the Rockies.

In 1932, the Ducks knocked off Louisiana State University 12-0 down at Baton Rouge. In 1934, the Bengals came back to win 14-13.

That game was on December 15, a few weeks before one of the power-laden Alabama ball clubs came into the Rose Bowl to trounce Stanford 29-13. That, by the way, was the day that Millard (Dixie) Howell ran 67 yards for an Alabama touchdown, and paced all others scoring with what was then a phenomenal passing exhibition.

Locker room post mortems of the Colorado players after the massacre was something on this order—"Oregon's a great ball club, but they're not that much better than us." Some of the Buffs were "happy" that the game was over and that they had shook a bad one out of their systems.

Pregame Emerald reports called the Mountaineers light and small. Little iron Chrobot didn't think so. "Don't kid yourself", he complained, "we never get to play any small teams."

Other Webfoots were hoping aloud while they dried off after their showers, and relaxed. They hoped that they could keep right on clicking against "big foes." Some talked about Santa Clara's upset over UCLA, and wished for another crack at the not-so-burly Bruin.

Like Old Man River, Bob Sanders kept right on rolling along Saturday, as he boosted his average to 6.3 yards per carry. The Webfooted tank from North Bend packed the mail eight times against Colorado and gained 68 yards. His net yard-
