

Socialized Medicine Prophesied 'Unless Present Trend Halted'

"Unless the present socialistic trend of the Federal government is halted, we will have socialized medicine in the next one or two years," Ralph W. Gwinn, Representative in Congress from New York's 27th district, told a group of Oregon doctors Friday night.

Gwinn was the main speaker at the annual banquet ending the 75th convention of the Oregon State Medical Society. Other speakers at the banquet in the Eugene hotel were David B. Simpson, Portland, and Governor Douglas McKay.

The trend toward socialism has been going on for over 35 years, Gwinn stated. Since 1913 when the federal government took over the power to tax the income of the private citizen.

GWINN URGES REBUTTAL

Appealing to the doctors to get out and fight socialism, the speaker said:

"Take hold of the Constitution, which is now as dead as a mackerel in the Pacific. Limit the power of the federal government, particu-

larly the power to tax. Limit forever the central government from private business, financing, and lending. Remember that all "aid" money comes from us, goes to Washington, and comes back to us minus deductions.

"Congress can't reverse now, so the people must do it. We have lost housing, almost lost Taft-Hartley, and will lose medicine the next year or the next," Gwinn stated. "We can't be part free and part socialist—it must be one or the other. Socialists are operating in the election districts. You must reach the unorganized, inarticulate people, or the socialists will organize them further and send their men to Washington.

PLANS TAX REDUCTION

Included in his plan for limiting the taxing powers of the government was a reduction in income taxes to 15 per cent, at the highest, and preferably 10 per cent; exemption of the first \$2000 income; exemption of the first \$6000 income of the corporations; and ex-

emption of the first \$600 paid for rent.

David B. Simpson, Portland business and real estate man, spoke against the proposed Columbia Valley Authority and said that the three-man administrative board would have too much control and that they would be responsible to no one but the president.

CVA BOARD CRITICIZED

If the public doesn't like the policies of the board, there is nothing it can do, he said. The members will be appointed so there is no way that the people can recall them or vote against them in the next election.

Simpson said that under the working of the bill, there is nothing that the board can't do. Everything pertaining to the Columbia River, its tributaries, and the land surrounding the rivers comes under the power of the board, he said.

The banquet Friday night ended the three day session of the Medical Society.
