

Ducks, Trojans Tangle Today

Men of Troy Favored in Crucial Test

Jim Aiken and his 37 Webfoots are set to write another chapter in a gridiron feud that started 34 years ago.

For the first time this season, Oregon will go into the game a definite underdog, a factor which has not alleviated the pressure against the University of Southern California which has to win this afternoon at the Los Angeles Coliseum—or forget the Rose Bowl.

Trojan mentor Jittery Jefferson Cravath will field an improved ball club over the one that dropped a 16-10 game to California a week ago. Four plugs in the USC forward wall will be back in the lineup. They are Mercer Barnes, center; Jim Bird, tackle; and Jim Monson and Tom Colley, guards.

Also returning to the Troy roster is right end Bob Stillwell, an all-America candidate who has been on the shelf. He was voted Southern California's collegiate lineman of the year in 1948 when he caught 14 passes for 159 yards.

One notable change in the USC starting lineup is the addition of former Portland prep star Pat Duff.

Aiken will send a veteran Oregon crew onto the Coliseum turf, one that can match the Men of Troy in almost every department except reserve depth. Southern Cal has a mob of approximately 50 players who can see action.

Oregon's last appearance at the Coliseum, a 35-27 loss to UCLA, marked the Duck line as flimsy, the backfield as tops. That same backfield will show this afternoon, with the possible exception of George Bell who was injured against Colorado.

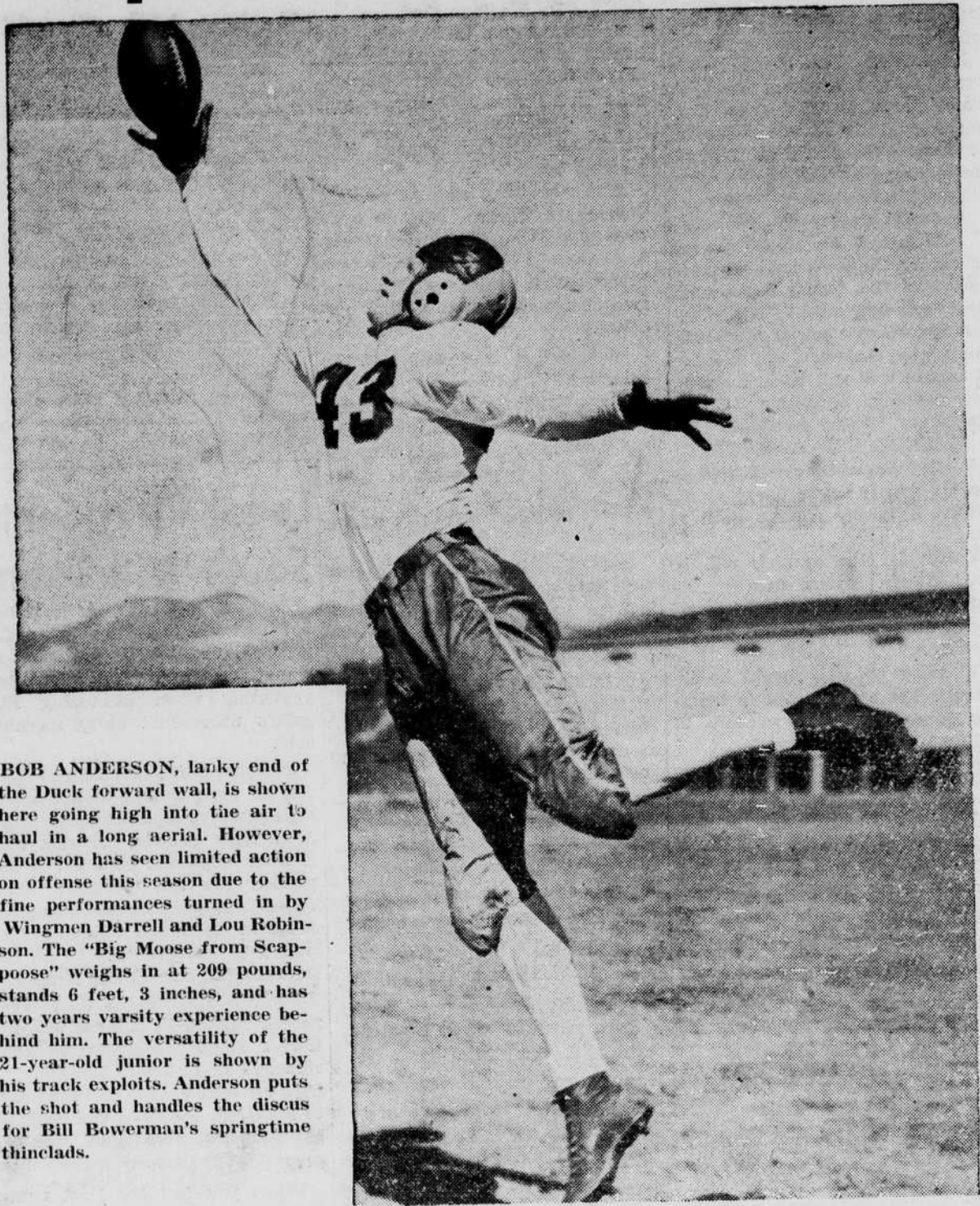
The backfield may be bolstered by several Aiken out-of-the-sleeve plays that have been kept under the wraps since the UCLA game. The defense has definitely toughened in the last two games, and is expected to keep the Trojan attack considerably below the 35 points tallied by the Bruins.

The Ducks, like USC, can ruin their already slim chances for the Rose Bowl by losing today.

The Troy loss to California, combined with the effect of television is expected to hold the crowd to about 40,000 for the top PCC game this week.

USC will go into the game with wins over Washington State and Navy, a tie with Ohio State and a loss to California. The Webfoots have beaten St. Mary's, Idaho, Washington State, and Colorado while losing to UCLA.

Washington State, the only common opponent, took a 35-7 lacing from USC, and bowed to Oregon, 21-0.

College of Pacific, San Diego State Set for Grueling Game

STOCKTON (UP)—It's hard to believe, but two undefeated football teams clash here tonight—and one of them is favored to win by about 40 points.

The victor, on past performances, should be the great College of Pacific eleven that is being rated as probably better than most of the Pacific Coast Conference clubs this year.

The losers should be the San Diego State Aztecs—a club that has a good, sound record this year, but hasn't met the competition that it will face in the high-gear COP team.

Piloted by little "Excellent Eddie LeBaron, the magician of the pigskin, the Tigers are expected to roll up at least 50 points. San Diego is reported handicapped by the loss of fullback Brian Hanzal, who was injured in the victorious struggle against New Mexico Aggies.

So far this season, College of Pacific has improved with every game. On successive Saturdays, Coach Larry Siemering's charges have met and won over: University of San Francisco, 7-6; Loyola, 52-0; Cincinnati, 34-7; Nevada, 47-6; and

Portland University, 75-20. Meanwhile, San Diego has looked stronger each week in disposing of Pepperdine, 9-7; Pomona, 33-13; and New Mexico A. & M. 39-18.

Moorhead Calls Meeting of Frosh
