

Federal Union Incorporated Head To Speak on World Government

Clarence K. Streit, president of Federal Union Incorporated, will speak on his plan for a union of several western European nations, Latin American and the United States at 7:30 p. m. tonight, 207 Chapman Hall.

Streit advocates a federal union with a central, constitutional government, each nation being an independent member according to E. S. Wengert, Head of the Political Science Department, who will introduce the speaker.

"The difference between the World Federalists and Mr. Streit's organization is that the former desire to bring the whole world into

their union, regardless of form of government while the latter say that the participating nation must have some form of independent government," Wengert pointed out.

Streit was a foreign correspondent for the New York Times and the Philadelphia Public Ledger in Paris, Rome, Vienna, and Constantinople in 1920 and in 1928 covered the League of Nations. During World War I he was with the Army Engineers and the Intelligence Service.

"Union Now" Streit's first book was written in 1939 and in 1941 he published "Union Now With Britain."
