

Duck Cagers Prepare For Salt Lake Games

Webfoot Open Season Friday With Utah State

A two-night stand at Salt Lake City Friday and Saturday will give University of Oregon basketball fans an idea of just what the 1949-50 Webfoots "have got."

Meanwhile, Head Coach John Warren, ran his cagers through a rugged practice session Tuesday at McArthur Court. The practice was highlighted by a scrimmage against the Frosh basketeers.

The Ducks will probably hit the road Thursday, and arrive in Salt Lake City in plenty of time to work out the kinks before tackling Utah State Friday night in the opener.

The Ducks will follow up by meeting the University of Utah the following night.

The Utah games are the first in a series of 11 non-conference workouts for Oregon before they begin Northern Division play Jan. 6.

Webfoot hopes ride with the effectiveness of Mel Streeter, transfer from Los Angeles, and the ability of Bob Amacher to develop as a scoring threat. Forward Will Urban's work under the basket, and whether Paul Sowers, sharp-shooting guard, will be hitting are other factors which will contribute to Duck failure or success.

The home court openers for the Oregon quintet are slated for Dec. 9 and 10 when the Blue-and-Gold Athletic club is expected to give the Webfoots a lesson in basketball. The Blue-and-Gold club was formerly the Oakland Bittners, who are the defending National A.A.U. champions.

The Ducks will test the strength of the Southern Division Dec. 20 and 21 when they play host to Stanford, at McArthur Court.

If unbeaten University House can extend their victory string to include Ann Judson House today, they will capture the 1949 intramural volleyball championship.

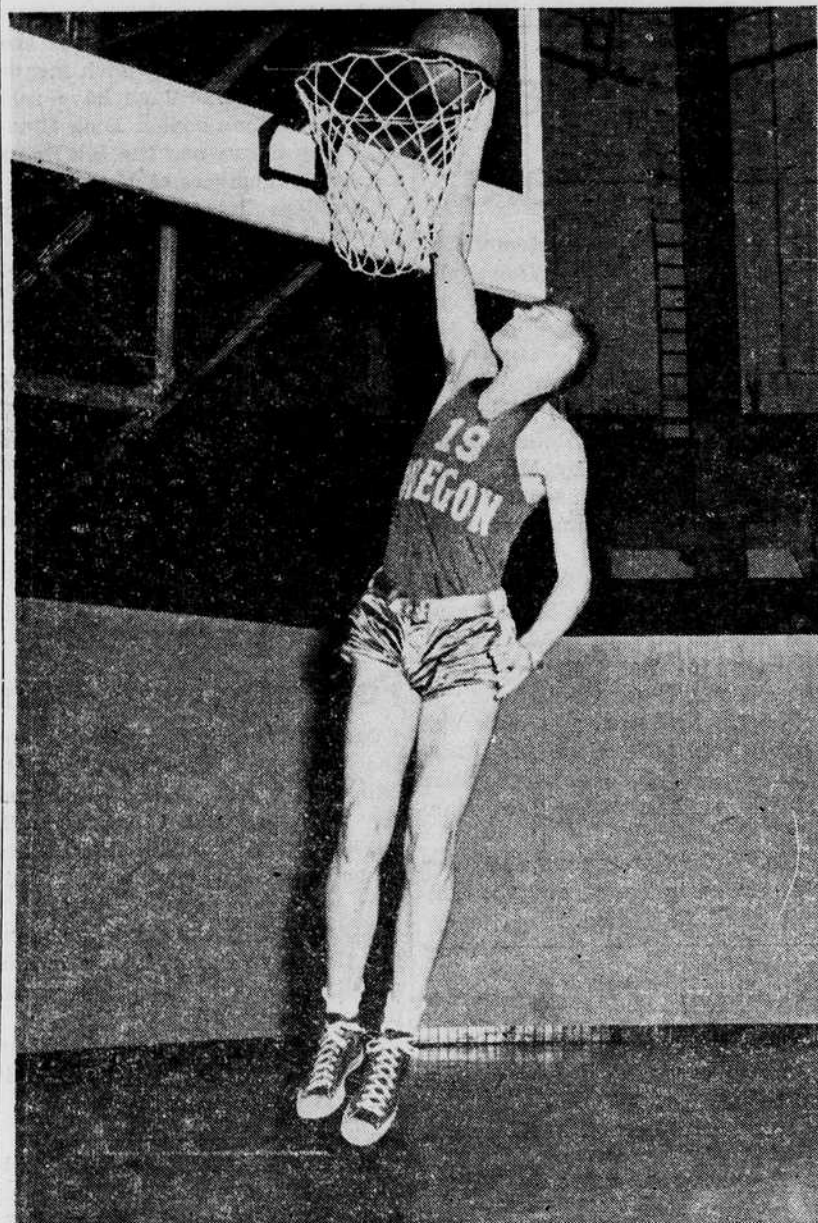

Villanova, which lost only to Tulsa and rated a prize post season catch, offered no reason for declining the newly organized bowl group's bid. In San Francisco, Leo C. Lee, president of the press club, said his organization "definitely is

going forward" with plans despite Villanova's refusal.

The salad bowl committee, which had already lined up Arizona (Tempe) State, completed its program when Xavier University of Cincinnati, O., accepted a bid to meet the Arizona team at Phoenix on Jan. 2.
