

# Speech Professor Receives Honors

Horace W. Robinson, professor of speech and director of the University Theater, was elected to the Advisory Council of the American Educational Theater Association. He attended its Chicago convention in December.

Several other honors were given him at the same time. He was elected one of five members of the Executive Council of AETA.

He was also reappointed to serve his third consecutive year as chairman of the Theater Architectural Committee of AETA. This body studies and reports on trends in theater architecture and gives assistance to high schools, colleges, and universities planning theaters.

Robinson's committee is now collecting plans, blueprints, models, sketches, and photographs of theaters for display at the Ann Arbor conference of Architects to be held on the University of Michigan campus this April.

This same display will be presented at the International Theater Institute in Paris this summer and will be used as a basis for the AETA conference to be held in New York next December. The conference will use Theater Architecture as its focal point.

# Club to Sponsor Italian War Film

The Italian film, "To Live in Peace," will be shown Jan. 25 and 26, at 7 and 9 p.m. by the Foreign Movies Club.

The movie concerns the liberation of Italy at the end of World War II. A wounded American soldier is housed by an Italian peasant family before the Germans have left.

The lead role is played by Aldo Fabrizi, the priest in "Open City." Humorous and high dramatic scenes take place between the American soldier and a German. Filmed in Italy, the movie has English subtitles.

The Foreign Movie club, organized by Rene Picard, assistant professor of romance languages, now has a membership of 1150, composed of both students and townspeople. Due to Christmas absences from Eugene by students, there have been no films until now. The next one will be in February.

# South American Trip is Offered To U.O. Students

Expense-free study in South America is offered to U.S. university and college students through a group of fellowships, James D. Kline, assistant registrar, reported Monday.

Deadline for submitting application is Feb. 15.

**ELIGIBILITY RULES**

Students eligible for these fellowships must possess bachelor's degrees, or their equivalent, and have completed some graduate work. They also must have a field of study or research topic approved by an adviser or supervising professor.

A good knowledge of the language of the country in which the student will study is necessary. Applicants must also hold U.S. citizenship.

**GOVERNMENTS TO PAY**

Tuition and a monthly maintenance allowance will be paid by the foreign government concerned, while either the U.S. government or the student will pay transportation expenses.

Preference will be given to veterans and students under 35 years of age.
