Sorority Row Experiences Snowball Vandalism Siege Columbia Post

Higher temperatures and melting snow brought trouble to four sorority houses which reported the breakage of several windows by hard-packed snow balls last night.

The windows were all broken about the same time by small groups of men the houses reported.

It was not determined whether they were high school or college students or whether all windows were broken by the same group.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS SUSPECTED

Members of some houses thought high school students were involved.

Alpha Gamma Delta reported that three windows were broken and that their door plate was missing. They thought the damage was done by a group of three college students about 7 p.m.

Gamma Phi Beta members said one window of their house was smashed about 7:15 last night by two men which they thought were high school students.

Grads May Win

A limited number of fellowships will be awarded this year to 1950 college graduates by the New York School of Social Work in Columbia University, New York City.

The fellowships provide for a three-quarter study program beginning Oct. 2, 1950, and ending in June, 1951.

Tuition of \$600 will be paid by the fellowships, and possibly a small supplementary grant for maintenance. This grant will not exceed \$187.50 each quarter, and will vary according to the needs of applicants. Estimates show that present day living expenses in New York City are a minimum of \$375 a quarter.

Fellowship applicants are required to meet the school's basic academic admission. Further details may be obtained by writing to The New York School of Social Work, Columbia University, Two East 91st Street, New York 28, N. Y.

Applications will be accepted through Mar. 1, 1950. Students awarded fellowships will be announced in June.

Baldinger Speaks At Art Conclave

Dr. W. S. Baldinger, art professor at the University of Oregon, will be a featured speaker on the program of the annual College Art. Association meeting in Chicago,

Dr. Baldinger will present a paper, "Orozco's Last Murals," which is the culmination of several years' study, including a year spent in Mexico in close contact with the painter Orozco, immediately prior to his death last September.

The report will be in the nature of a revelation, for little was known of Orozco's work in the last year of his life, Dr. Baldinger explained.

"I was fortunate to be on hand at that time and gather the material. Orozco is regarded as one of the greatest mural painters of today."

Dr. Baldinger will leave Monday and return Jan. 30.
