Eldon Johnson, dean of the College of Liberal Arts and the Graduate School, has returned from a trip to the East where he spent several weeks.

He attended three professional meetings, presented a paper, and visited several universities.

At the American Political Science meeting held in New York City, Johnson was invited to speak on the Pacific Northwest States. His talk continued a series of papers on regional development which are being presented intermittently by different regions at these meetings.

Johnson's topic concerned the development of the Columbia. He discussed what Pacific Northwest States have done and what they intend to do toward development of resources of the Columbia. It is his opinion that there is no prospect or hope for establishment of an inter-state substitute for Federal Government control.

He backed his statement on the basis of the history of the Northwest and the few inter-state compacts that have been made. He noted that in the past the Northwest States have been unwilling to compromise regarding resources of their territories. Another point brought forth was the lack of financial backing in this region.

While in the East, Johnson attended two other professional meetings, The American Conference of Academic Deans and the Association of American Colleges, where problems were discussed and suggestions for improvements were made.

During his trip he stopped at the University of Missouri, University of Kentucky, and Indiana University, where he discussed mutual problems with the deans of the Liberal Arts Colleges and Graduate Schools.

# Noted Scientist Schedules Talk On Latin History

Dr. George Gaylord Simpson, of the American Museum of Natural History, will speak Jan. 24, at 8 p.m., in 207 Chapman.

The title of Dr. Simpson's lecture is "History of the Latin American Fauna."

Because of his South American research, Dr. Simpson was elected honorary associate of the Museo de Ciencias Naturales in Caracas, Venezuela and honorary correspondent for the Sociedad Argentina des Estudios Geograficos Gaea. He authored articles in Spanish which were published in Venezuela.

Dr. Simpson is a prominent vertebrate paleontologist, author of many scientific books and journals and recipient of several science medals. He holds memberships in 10 science honoraries.

Dr. Simpson is chairman of the American Museum of Natural History geology and paleontology department and has been associated with the Museum since 1924. He is also a professor of vertebrate paleontology at Columbia University in New York city.

A graduate of the University of Colorado, Dr. Simpson earned his Ph.D. at Yale, where he did research on Mesozoic mammals. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, national scholastic honorary, and Sigma Xi, history honorary. During World War II, he served as a major in the Army.
