Law Men to Debate Jenkins vs. Forenson In Oral Arguments

The oral arguments scheduled annually by the Law School will be held on Feb. 6 at 7:15 p.m. in room 3 Fenton Hall.

Jenkins vs. Forenson will be argued by oral arguments finalists. The case involves a peculiar invasion of property situation. Prior to the arguments the bailiff will summarize the case and the previous proceedings that occurred in a lower court.

The court will consist of Judge William G. East, of the Lane County Circuit Court, who will act as chief justice, and associate judges, Judge A. Anderson of the Lane County District Court, and Judge John Barber of the Eugene Municipal Court.

To Preside

These men will preside over the arguments and decide the winners. The winners will be judged on their ability to argue the law, and bring forth a written brief and oral argument.

In preliminary and semi-final rounds held spring term, the following men reached the finals:

Dave Young and Bill Tassock (appellants on appeal), and Ted Goodwin and Jim Harrang (respondents on appeal).

Each side will have a half-hour to present its arguments. The

brief is handed in a week ahead of time and contains authority on the matter.

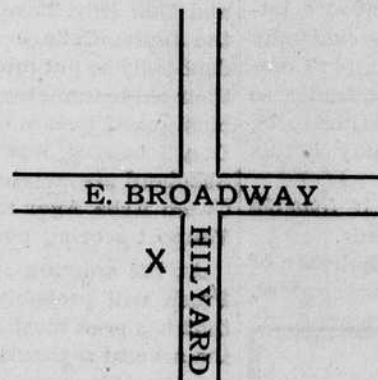

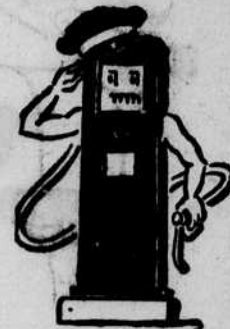
