

Alum Magazine Tells Successes

Old Oregon, alumni magazine, records in its current issue the success of alumni in the post-college world.

In the article "Where ASUO Presidents Go," Jim Knight sketches the careers of Oregon student body presidents from 1902 to the present day. Three former prexies are listed in "Who's Who in America."

Results of a poll taken recently by the west coast alumni associations are printed to show the financial status of Oregon alumni as compared with graduates of five other Pacific schools. Oregon placed second in the poll, with a graduate income average of \$9727 per year.

"As Universities Are Known," by Hank Kane, is concerned with the assets of maintaining an outstanding graduate school.

Dr. Karl Onthank, graduate placement director, discusses the job opportunities of the class of 1950. His article is entitled, "Record Class Eyes Job Market."

New developments in the Oregon athletic program are treated in two articles, "Duck Swim Coach Eyes Bright Year" by Fred Taylor and "Hayward Field Renovation" by Tom King.

A recent aerial photo of the campus and round-up of the present building program are featured.

Policemen In Training On Campus

The second class in the regional school for advanced training of police officers will be held today in Guild Theater, Johnson Hall.

The class, on interviews, will be instructed by Special Agent Max E. Taylor, Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Forty-two city and county police officers attended the first session of the school Friday. Members of the Eugene, Springfield, Roseburg, and Cottage Grove departments, the local state patrol, and the Lane County sheriff's office attended the class on criminal investigation laboratory aids conducted by Jack H. Bears, assistant director of the state police crime laboratory in Portland.

Sponsors of the training program are the Oregon State Sheriff's Association and the Oregon Association of City Police Officers. The University Bureau of Municipal Research is cooperating in the program with the state division of vocational education, the FBI, the state police, and the Portland Police Bureau.

Next session in Eugene will be Friday, with patrol techniques as the subject.
