

Survey Reveals Degree Origin

A survey taken recently by Dean Eldon Johnson, of the College of Liberal Arts, on the educational backgrounds of faculty members of the college, disclosed that 14 staff members hold masters degrees from the University of Oregon.

The Liberal Arts teaching staff represents 19 institutions and a total of 97 professors with Ph.D. degrees.

The survey also revealed that more teachers graduated with doctorate degrees from the University of California and Stanford University than from any other institutions.

1st-Hand Religion Theme of Week At U.O. Feb. 12-16

"First-Hand Religion" is the theme for this year's Religious Evaluation Week which Charles W. Gilkey, principal speaker will deliver a series of addresses throughout the period, which ends Thursday, Feb. 16.

"Participation in an observance as this is nothing new for Dr. Gilkey," Bob Kingsbury, student chairman of Religious Evaluation Week, asserted Monday.

Personal interviews with interested students will be scheduled each morning, Monday through Thursday. Luncheons will be held throughout the week, and the major platform addresses will be delivered each afternoon at 4 p.m.

Firesides will be held at all campus living organizations Tuesday evening at 5:30 or 10:30.

Excursion Offered South of Border

Dr. Juan B. Rael of Stanford University, will conduct an educational tour of Mexico and Guatemala this summer.

The tour will include Acapulco, Cordoba, Guernavaca, Fortin, Guadalajara, Mexico City, Morelia, Orizaba, Patzcuaro, Pueblo, Taxco, Tehuacan, Toluca, Uruapan, and Paricutin volcano.

Cost will range from \$325 to \$520, depending upon the length of the tour. Minimum cost is for a two-week period between July 14 and July 30, 1950; or an automobile tour between August 7 and August 30.
