# Openings Made In Army Here; 45 Men Needed

Several openings in the enlisted ranks of Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 426th Transportation Truck Battalion, were created recently by a Sixth Army order, according to Lt. Col. Charles F. Ziebarth, unit commander, and professor of business administration.

The Sixth Army's order changed the designation of the local organization's headquarters unit from a detachment to a full-fledged company, thus opening its table of organization to at least 45 more enlisted men. Men in the organization receive one day's pay in grade for each meeting attended.

"We are particularly interested in attracting members into our organization who have an interest and some background in truck transportation operations and maintenance," Colonel Ziebarth said. "However, previous experience is not required since men will receive training in the unit."

All openings are above the rank of private with the following specific grades vacant: 2 master sergeants; 1 sergeant first class; 9 sergeants; 15 corporals; and 18 privates first class. There is also an opening for one company grade officer in the commissioned ranks.

"These openings should appeal particularly to students interested in gaining some practical training in transportation as well as some additional funds," Colonel Ziebarth said.

Men who are interested in becoming members of the organization may receive further details by contacting First Sergeant C. B. Rufkahr, assistant unit instructor of the Eugene Organized Reserve Corps, or by appearing at the company's next meeting on Feb. 6, at 7:30 p.m. at 1450 West 12th street.
