

Extension of Main Pipe Causes Water Shut-off for Several Hours

Water service was shut off for three hours Saturday from 13th to 17th between Alder and Kincaid streets while the Eugene Water Board crews worked on an extension of the main water pipe to give the campus added fire protection.

Workmen placed a 12-inch pipe along 15th from Alder to Kincaid. This is part of the plan adopted by the University

and the city to help fight any campus fire hazard.

Three Hours Work

The water service was stopped at 10 a. m. and restored about 1 p. m. The curtailment affected all houses along Alder and Kincaid, including both Vet's Dorms number one and two.

The next planned development of the water system for the University is scheduled by the water board for Agate street between 14th and 15th. Spokesman of the board was not sure when this work would be done.

The first of 12 new fire hydrants to be installed on the campus was set up recently near the site of the new heating plant across the millrace.

Two More Slated

Excavations are being made for two more to be put in this week, but the other nine will not be installed until after Apr. 1. Workmen are laying the eight-inch pipeline for the system which will be connected to the city water line on Franklin Blvd.

Altogether the University and the city will install about 5,400 feet of 12 and 8-inch pipe with 4,200 feet being laid on the campus. The remaining amount will skirt the campus as part of the joint city-University plan of fire prevention.

your own, you can find an answer or a way out. Borrowed doubts and difficulties can never be answered."

The same advice holds true for borrowed answers to religious perplexities, Dr. Gilkey stated. The ideas of ministers, professors, and friends can be of great value as "half-way houses" on the individual's road to religion, but they must remain "half-way houses" and not be taken as an end in themselves, he explained.

"Sooner or later life stands every one of us up against the wall and asks us 'what do you have to meet this crisis with?'" Dr. Gilkey said. Answers borrowed from the formulas of others won't be accepted then, he pointed out.

This is especially true of the "evil spirits" of post war life, Dr. Gilkey asserted. Our generation is tormented by anxiety, fears about the human future and the kind of world we are coming to.

"It is strange that the most prosperous country in the world should be the most nearly hysterical," he remarked.

Americans are looking for a way of casting out the evil spirits of frustration and anxiety, the speaker said. To do this we must find the way from quoted, borrowed, second-hand religion to first-hand religion about which we can speak in the first person singular.

To illustrate the direction in which one must look for first-hand religion, Dr. Gilkey quoted a post-war sonnet by Robert Nathan:

"For still the heart by love and pity wrung
Finds the same God as when the world was young."

When we find something outside ourselves for which we can work, we are on the way to first-hand religion, Dr. Gilkey asserted.

"Look for things more important than your own happiness and your own success." Pray about things real to you and discover that prayer is more than a one-way street; God will come out to meet you."

There will be two showings each night, at 7 and 9 p. m.

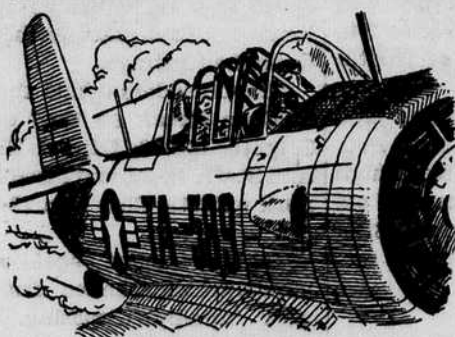
