Delta Tau Delta powered over Campbell Club yesterday in inter-organizational track by a lop-sided score of 42-17.

One record was cracked in the meet when Delt George Guldager topped the hurdles in 5.5 seconds.

The Delts swept all but one event in the meet and took four second places.

Campbell Club took first and second place in the three-quarter mile when Stansbury ran the distance in 3:48.8, which is just eight-tenths of a second from the record.

Second behind Guldager in the hurdles was Doug Farrell of Delta Tau Delta.

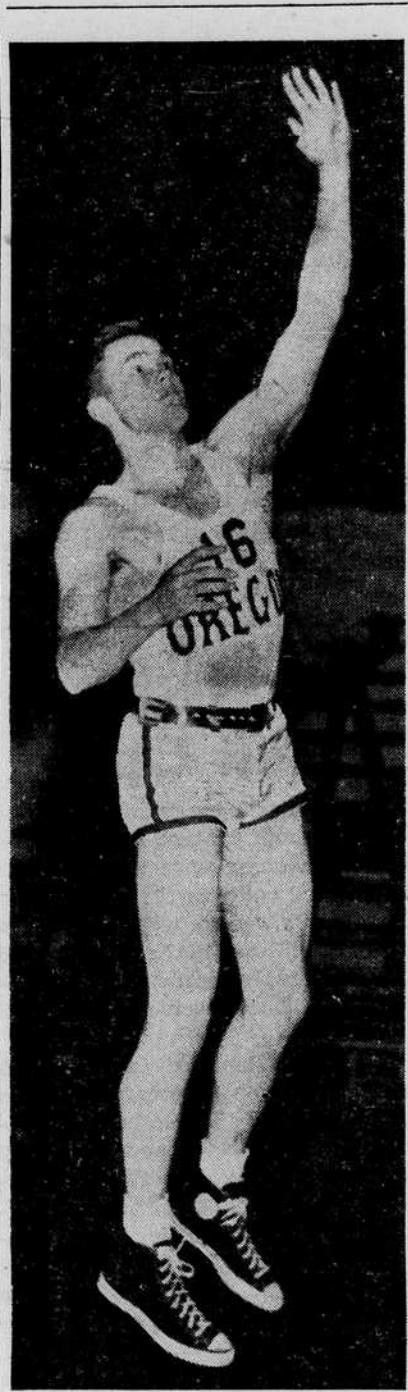
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Beavers Squelch Idaho Push To Pull Out 48-44 ND Win



CORVALLIS — (UP) — Oregon State's Beavers stopped two Idaho rallies in the second half last night to score a 48-44 Northern Division basketball victory before 5,320 fans.

Oregon State's win keeps the Beavers in the running for division title honors with Washington and Washington State. Idaho and Oregon now tie for fourth place.

Idaho's only lead in the game came after six minutes of play when the Vandals moved ahead 6-5. The score was tied twice during the game's first 10 minutes. OSC held down a 23-18 halftime lead.

After the Beavers pushed out to a 36-24 second half lead, Idaho's first rally began as the Vandals scored 39-33 with seven minutes left in the game.

With two minutes time left in the game, Coach Slat's Gill threw in his second and third stringers. Idaho's second rally of the night started 71 seconds before the end of the game as Dick Reed, Bob Wheeler, and Herb Mead scored a total of seven points.

Both teams play here again tonight.

Portland Mentor Foresaw Gridiron Power By 1951

PORTLAND, Ore. — (UP) — Harry C. Wright, athletic director and football coach at Portland University said Tuesday he would leave the school, "as soon as I can clear up my office business as athletic director."

Portland Saturday announced the suspension of intercollegiate football.

Wright said he was leaving because of the dropping of football, but he expected to land a new coaching berth soon.

"Two people, who are big men in the football profession, are applying for me for two coaching jobs, one on the East Coast and one on the West. I have not made a personal application to any school, but I will be receptive toward the right coaching job," he said.

"My parting with Portland," he added, "will be made on a friendly basis and there will be a cash settlement involved. We did not expect the 1949 football team to win any big games consistently, but we had expected to have a team by 1951 that would not back down to anyone, including California."

Rebecs Clobber Alpha Xi Deltas
