

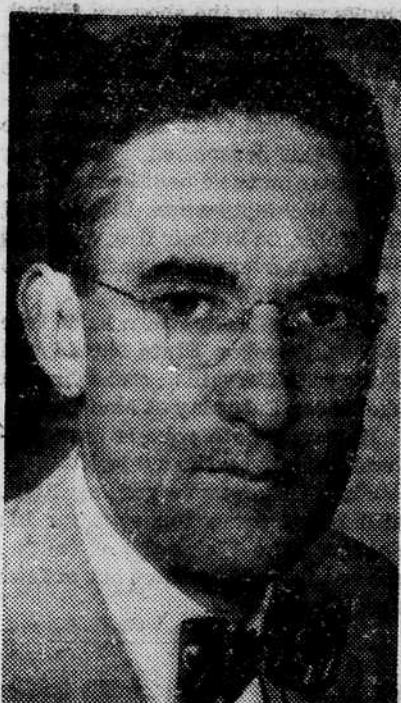
Gange to Air Views On Foreign Policy

John F. Gange, director of the Woodrow Wilson School of Foreign Affairs at the University of Virginia, will speak on "The Marshall Plan" in the University Theater tomorrow at 4 p.m.

Ganges is on the campus as guest speaker for the third annual International Relations League conference, which begins tomorrow.

she is liason officer. Both addresses are open to the public.

Delegates to the conference will arrive on the campus today and tomorrow morning from 40 high schools in Oregon and one in Washington. General topic for the conference will be "Will Present United States Foreign Policy Promote Peace and Prosperity?"

To Imitate Senate

The group will take the form of the United States Senate, with committees considering various aspects of United States foreign policy and formulating conclusions for presentation to the group at its final session Saturday morning.

Registration of delegates will be held at Johnson Hall until midnight tonight and all day tomorrow. About 225 members and advisers of high school international relations clubs are expected to attend. They will be housed in University dormitories, fraternities, and sororities.

First session of the conference will be tomorrow morning, including introductions, welcoming speeches, and an address by Mrs. Holmes. Gange will speak at the annual banquet at the Osburn Hotel.

Geology Field Trip Proves Fun, Too

One-hundred students who accompanied L. W. Staples and E. M. Baldwin on the geology department's annual field trip to the coast over the weekend found that "it wasn't all work."

Although the proceedings were previously planned the group still managed to take part in some unscheduled events. The first of these was at Bay Ocean where 80-year old F. D. Mitchell gave them a vivid account of the town's history and its great erosion.

At Tillamook, where the group spent Saturday night, they were entertained by townspeople. The Pioneer Museum was opened especially for them, and Ruth Coats, after displaying her shell and fossil laboratory and collection, presented them with complimentary tickets to the Fireman's Ball.

Dr. Staples found this trip to be particularly pleasant because of the weather, which was "much nicer than what we've had on any previous field trip to the coast."

Magazine Prints Article by Moore

Carlisle Moore, professor of English, authored an article published in the fall issue of the Explicator, literary periodical. Topic was "Shakespeare's Sonnets 71 Through 74."

Moore's article dealt with interpretation of the language in Shakespeare's sonnets.

The Explicator is a scholarly magazine primarily concerned with such problems of literary interpretation. It deals with both modern and classical poetry and prose.

Norman Thomas To Emphasize Man, Society

Norman Thomas, six-times candidate for president on the Socialist ticket, will speak before students, faculty, and townspeople in McArthur Court Wednesday at 7:30 p. m.

His topic, "Life and Loyalties," will emphasize the epics of man and society, and their dependence on man's various loyalties. He will apply this principle to family life and to larger social relationships, on up to a discussion of nationalism's place for believers in "One World."

Thomas, who is violently anti-Communist, has debated on Town Hall of the Air and other well-known forum programs. He has debated recently with Raymond Swing, and William H. Chamberlin.

The lecture is sponsored by the University Assembly Committee of which Dan E. Clank, head of the history department, is chairman. Following the speech, a faculty reception will be held.

Thomas will speak in Portland Feb. 28, and in Corvallis the afternoon of Mar. 1.

Classification Change for Federal White Collar Workers Announced

Federal white-collar workers who were formerly classified into the various federal services are now included in a single general schedule of eighteen grades. Changes were also made in wage scales.

These changes in federal salary schedules should be of interest to University students, particularly

1950 graduates, states Karl W. Onthank, graduate placement service director. He feels they are especially informative in conjunction with the Conference on University Level Occupation in the Federal Service to be held here Thursday.

The new schedule includes the following minimum and maximum salary ranges, number of rates, and step increases:

Some 229 top positions not included in the classified service have received a higher salary schedule which ranges from \$22,500 for heads of executive departments to \$14,000 for some heads of smaller bureaus of independent commissions and boards.

Science to be Discussed

Science will be discussed in 107 Commerce Hall by Scott Hazen, safety engineer, and Merrill Collet, personnel director, with the Bonneville Power Administration. R. T. Ellickson, physics department head, and associate dean of the Graduate School, will preside.

Secretarial and office management speakers will be heard in 105 Commerce Hall. They will be Clyde Quam, administrative assistant, Willamette National Forest, and Frank Cole, personnel, Corps of Engineers. Miss Jessie Smith, professor of business administration will preside.

Social science and general business information will be aired in 105 Commerce Hall by E. W. Arnold, chief of the Veterans Guidance Center on campus, and Carol Johnson, personnel, Reconstruction Finance Corporation. Presiding will be E. C. Robbins, instruction in economics. Students may arrange personal interviews with federal representatives following the section meetings.

Grad Office Helps

Arrangements for the conference were made jointly by the Federal Personnel Council of Portland and the University Graduate Placement Bureau with the cooperation of teaching departments.

Plans were formulated to give all classes of students information on federal work, as well as to recruit 1950 graduates into the service, states Karl W. Onthank, graduate placement service director. He urges all interested students to attend the meetings.

Faculty members may meet the federal representatives at a noon luncheon today in the Faculty Club. Speaker at the luncheon will be Merrill Collett. Relations between college faculties and federal agencies will be included in his talk. E. S. Wengert, political science department head, will preside at the luncheon.
