Holms Notes Progress In U.N. Children's Fund

No major East-West conflict has yet occurred in the administration of the United Nations Children's Fund, Mrs. Grace Bok Holmes, liaison officer for the fund, declared Thursday night before members of the Eugene branch of the American Association of University Women.

This is one of the most encouraging parts of U.N. work, Mrs. Holmes believes. She gave a report of activities of the fund, having observed them first-hand on a tour of Europe last summer studying the feeding program in the 26-member nations.

Mrs. Holmes spoke Friday morning at the opening session of the high school International Relations League conference on the same subject, "The International Children's Emergency Fund."

The fund, operating on a \$200 million budget since its inauguration more than three years ago, works on a co-operative basis with participating nations. One half of

the program is financed by the U. N. Countries give matching funds in money, produce, or labor.

"One purpose of the program is to help countries help themselves," Mrs. Holmes pointed out.

For the last year six million children have received food under this plan, which resembles the "School Lunch Program" in the United States. For the two years before this, four million were fed.

The program was expanded to Latin America beginning with the Ecuador earthquake. The purpose, Mrs. Holmes said, was to make these countries aware of their own child welfare needs.

The executive board administering this fund under the U.N. Secretariat is now meeting at Lake Success to make final allocations. Work of the emergency fund should be completed by the end of this year or next, Mrs. Holmes stated. Its duties will then be transferred to other agencies.

Representatives from the Etna Life Insurance Company will be on campus Thursday to interview job applicants. A general meeting will be held at 1 p. m. for all interested. Students wishing to obtain more details and attend the meeting may contact the placement office in 216 Emerald Hall.

The First National Bank is offering summer work to college students in cities and towns throughout the state. Positions open are chiefly those of substitute tellers, although a few others will be available.

Men with cashiering experience and an interest in banking are de-

sired, but neither qualification is necessary. The majority of the positions will be filled by men, but a few jobs will be open to women.

The California Department of Social Welfare, now being re-organized, is looking for public assistance and other personnel workers. 1950 graduates in sociology are preferred but not required.

Idaho is offering examinations for several different jobs, among which are secretarial, stenographic, wild life, and laboratory assistant work.

The closing date for both California and Idaho examination applications is coming soon, Onthank stated.

Onthank advises students, particularly 1950 graduates, interested in finding work to come into the placement office at once and fill out both the office forms and those for the Oregon Dads.

Veteran's Bonus Possible Issue In Next Election

The possibility of a vote on an Oregon Veteran's bonus may come up at the November elections.

Department Commander Vere McCarty of the Veteran's of Foreign Wars, and Department Commander Samuel E. Bowe of the American Legion have filed a joint intention to circulate an initiative petition to put bonus proposal on the ballot.

The bonus would be given only to veterans who were residents of Oregon in World War II for one year before entering service. Inclusive dates for payment are September 16, 1940 to June 30, 1946. All service for which payment would be made must have been honorable.

Payment would be at the rate of \$10 for each full month of domestic service, and \$15 for each full month of overseas service.

All expenses of the campaign will be defrayed by sale of Bonus Booster Buttons which will be offered for sale at fifty cents.
