One of the main reasons for this extension was the week-end break in soliciting activities.

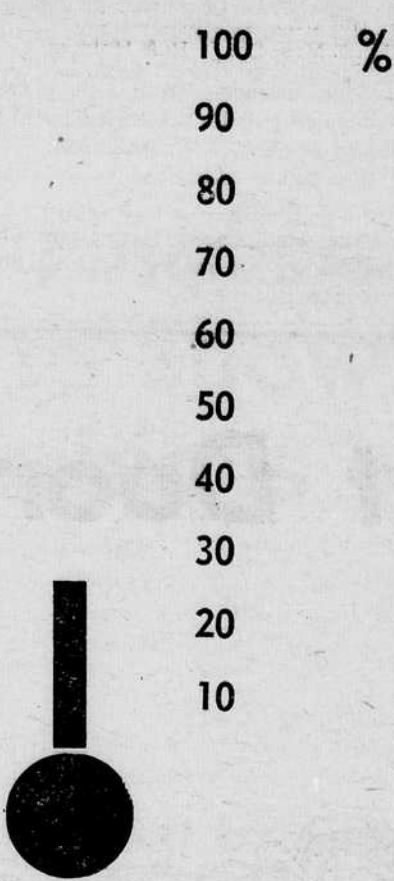
To date approximately 27 per cent of the campus total of \$2,000 has been received. It is imperative that representatives from each living organization turn in daily receipts to their respective directors.

Chaney tallied five markers and Chuck Rufner added two gift tosses to give the Chi Psi crew a 7-2 first period supremacy.

Strader duplicated the five point feat in the second period, and this coupled with a field goal and a free throw by Rufner and three successful charity tosses by Jim Hayden gave the Chi Psi five a 17-3 half-time lead. Merwin Bernstein added a point to the Nestor total in this period.

Nestor went scoreless while Chi

Psi's Strader and Chaney rang the bell for seven points to make the score at the end of the third tanza read 24-3.

In the fourth period Nestor made a belated comeback. Dick Courtwright, Bernstein, Lorin Miller, D. Jolly, and Jim Jolly, led the Nestor scoring spree. Rufner and Bob Maxwell accounted for Chi Psis last three markers.

The third period and for that matter the second half was all Beta. Bob Rasmussen scored twice and Hayes and Keller accounted for three; Holloman dumped in a fielder to make the score read 17-12 at the end of the third quarter. There was only one twine tinger in the final period—a lay-in by Vincent.

Material must be typed in triplicate, and enclosed in a manila envelope marked with poem titles. Author's name should be separately enclosed in a sealed envelope, with address, class, and poem titles.

Entries will be accepted by the secretary of the English department through May 1. Information is available on the Friendly Hall bulletin board.
