a closer personal relationship with the students in their organizations, the report urged. Recommendations included the appointment of a full-time Head of Counselors to plan selection, qualifications, and training of counselors. Since counselors in the Vet's Dorms must employ much of their time in mechanical duties, it was suggested that a student be paid room rent to take over these functions, leaving the counselor more time for individual counselling.

Apathy is the chief obstacle to successful hall organization, the committee reported.

Some universities place Greek and Independent living organizations in separate intramural leagues, the report stated. The committee does not definitely recommend this practice, but suggests further investigation since it is felt that competition is sometimes unfair.

The committee suggested that rather than have overcrowded conditions in dormitories, upper division women be permitted to live in off-campus housing.

It was felt that the University should put more money back into

the Vet's Dorms, possibly dividing them into upper and lower floor units and giving each hall a double room for social purposes.

The report emphasized the necessity for action within the next three months, stating that if the situation is left as it is deferred living-in could mean educational regression at the University since some features of campus life would be thrown badly out of gear.

Reasoning behind the recommendation for cancellation of the Frosh Glee was that of four major dances held on the campus this year, only the Sophomore Wisherino has shown a profit, with losses ranging from \$35 to \$700.

Suggestions for other activities for the freshmen included an afternoon terrace dance and a picnic.

The Student Union Board's tentative perpetuation plan is to apply to the school year 1950-51.

Under the plan, the president and first vice-president of the ASUO would be ex-officio, voting members of the board. Other members would be 2 students from the College of Liberal Arts and one student from each of the professional schools. Juniors and sophomores on the board this year will continue as members; the seniors will be replaced by sophomores in their re-

spective schools.

New members will be chosen by a procedure consisting of filing petitions, which will be sent to the deans. The deans may strike off names which they consider unsuitable.

A joint committee of four members each from the Student Union Board and the Executive Council, with each political party having equal representation, will choose the new members.

Vacancies on the Board will be replaced by the Board itself until the end of the school year, when

new members are chosen.

Two voting faculty members will be appointed for two-year overlapping terms by University President Harry K. Newburn. Director of Student Affairs Donald M. DuShane and Student Union Director Dick Williams are nonvoting members.

"This plan offers as close a tie between the Student Union Board and the ASUO as is possible without involving it in campus politics, and will serve to bring the agencies of student government together," ASUO President Art Johnson stated.

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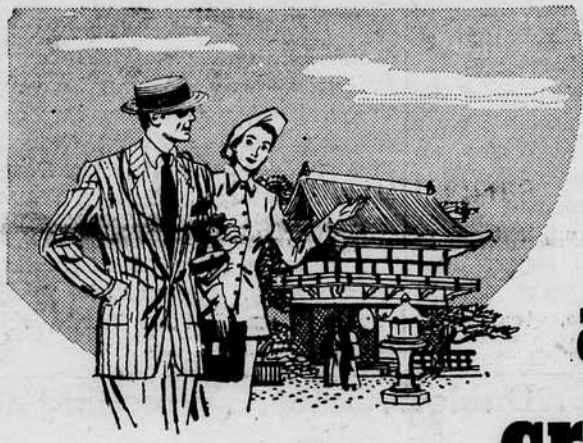


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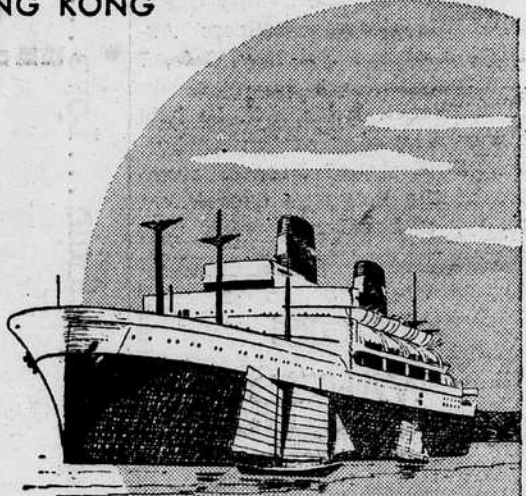


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
