Dr. John Anderson, head of the department of religion at Lewis and Clark College, delivered the sermon, "The Light Still Shines."

Dr. Anderson, in the Easter message, stated that men have always asked the question, "Is there life eternal?"

The questioning was changed to certainty when Jesus brought hope to the world with His resurrection from the dead, Dr. Anderson declared.

"Although there is still the darkness of sin, it will never conquer the world, for the Light still shines."

Dr. Anderson emphasized that there is still victory in Christ, but He must be welcomed by each person individually. However, as light shining into a dark room, He enters in every possible way.


