Aiken Scrimmages 65; Praises Quarterbacks, Halfbacks, Linebackers

Oregon's spring football squad dived into its second week of practice yesterday with a hard scrimmage lasting until 6:15.

Coach Jim Aiken worked "at least 65 men" in yesterday's scrimmage. Backfield mentor Jerry Lillie handled the new men, while Aiken took care of his more experienced men.

Aiken said after practice that he still wants to separate the men from the boys. For this reason, he will hold four heavy scrimmages this week. He may possibly hold an afternoon practice on Saturday.

Aiken listed as his hardest working quarterbacks Earl Stelle, Hal Dunham, Leo Gilnet, and Hobart Marvin. Gilnet played last season for Lower Columbia Junior College at Longview, after part of a season with the Oregon Frosh two years ago.

Calderwood Not Out

Gilnet will add kicking strength to the team, as well as some passing ability. Aiken's regular punter of last season, Jim Calderwood, has not reported for practice for the last two sessions.

Outstanding candidate for the left halfback position at present is Bill Fell, Aiken asserted. Fell is still running through the entire defensive team for touchdowns at least once or twice in every practice.

At the right half spot, Aiken listed Darwin Farsworth as the top candidate for the present. Bob Carey turned in the best performance on the field yesterday, however, according to the mentor. Carey has been plying regular defensive safety.

Lyons Tops Fulls

Other right halves in the order of their performance to date, as listed by Aiken, are Ray Karnofski, Don Sloan, and Stan Ruzicka.

Tommy Lyons looked to be the best fullback on the field yesterday. Aiken said that Lyons, along with Fell and Carey, were the stars of the day.

Iowa Hoop Boss Fired; Charges 'Personal Feud'

IOWA CITY, Ia.—(UP)—Lawrence (Pops) Harrison, Iowa basketball coach since 1931, was fired from his \$7,000 a year job by the Iowa Board of Control of Athletics Monday for "failure" in three responsibilities.

The fiery little tutor, who first joined the Iowa staff as an assistant basketball and baseball coach, immediately charged the action resulted from a "personal feud" with Athletic Director Paul Brechler. Harrison became head cage coach in 1942.

Harrison was dropped, the board statement said, "as a result of failure to perform certain duties assigned to him, his failure to conform to certain practices and policies of the athletic department, and failure to otherwise conduct himself in such a manner as to bring credit to the University and the athletic department."

Harrison's Iowa Hawkeyes defeated the University of Oregon Webfoots twice during the last basketball season.

Jack Smith was named as starting catcher, with the rest of the infield shaping up in the same manner as it did for previous games. Phil Settecase will be at first base, Daryle Nelson at second, and Ray Coley will be shortstop.

Yesterday's long practice may have produced some bad results when Don Kimball, the veteran third baseman sprained his knee toward the conclusion of the drill.

A recurrence of the injury that hampered the hard hitting Kimball last year might keep him out of action until the conference opener against Washington State on Friday.

Kirsch Hopeful

Hopefully, Don Kirsch last night named Kimball to the starting lineup with a possibility that Nick Schmer would play third base if the knee injury was still aggravating the regular third baseman.

Ray Stratton will be in left field, and Dick Salter will patrol center. Little Joe Tom who's ability with the bat has proved impressive over the last week, will play right field.

Just who would follow Krause, Kirsch did not know. He expressed the wish that he would like to start Mel against the power laden Cougars on Friday, and mentioned Jim Hanns, the big fastballer, and veteran Sid Mills as possibilities for seeing service today.

Century Club Honors Aiken

Jim Aiken, the University of Oregon's Mister Football, who has guided his gridiron teams to victory on 201 different weekends, became an award winner in the newly formed Sports Trail Century Club in Chicago.

The honorary organization is open to all college and school coaches whose athletic teams have won 100 or more contests in any sport.

Aiken said Monday that he had received a nicely framed certificate, or as he termed it "diploma" from the Chicago group.

Aiken's 200th triumph was regis-

tered last fall when the Oregon gridiron contingent bounced back from a defeat at the hands of UCLA to rap the Washington State Cougars 21-0 on their home field.

Win number 201 went on the record books one week later when the Webfoots pounded the University of Colorado Buffaloes into the Hayward Field turf.

William Matthei, coach at Bayview High School, Milwaukee, Wis., received the first Century Club award for coaching cross-country teams that have come out second to none in 100 meets.

WSC Invades Valley; Seeks Fourth Pennant

PULLMAN, Wash. — Washington State College's varsity baseball team is ready to defend its Northern Division baseball crown and is hoping to annex a fourth consecutive pennant win. This week the Cougars will open the flag drive with games in the Willamette Valley and Seattle, opening in Corvallis, April 12.

The Cougars will tangle with Coach Ralph Coleman's Oregon State Beavers at Corvallis in the first game of the current Northern Division season on Wednesday April 12. The Beavers and Cougars will play again April 13.

Friday and Saturday the WSC squad will be in Eugene for a two game series with Coach Don Kirsch's strong University of Oregon squad.

Cougars Travel

Following the Willamette Valley games, the Cougars will move north to Seattle and a two game series with Coach Art McLarney's University of Washington Huskies on Monday and Tuesday April 17 and 18, before heading home to Pullman.

Wet home grounds have forced the Cougars to play all of their games away from home, traveling over 60 miles per game. Lewiston, Ida. and Walla Walla, Wash. have been the sites of all Cougar pre-season play.

In addition to traveling to all their games, the WSC diamond crew has been forced to do all its practicing inside the field house. No outdoor drills have been held on the WSC home diamond this season.

The Cougar moundstaff, composed of three lettermen and four sophomores, has been shining in pre-season contests.
