

# Reserve Training Program Expanding



Increased activity of military planes in the Eugene area on weekends was explained by the navy last week as a stepped-up reserve training program which is becoming increasingly popular with reserve Lane county pilots. The Associated Volunteer Aviation Unit No. 3, with headquarters in Salem, operates as part of the Naval Air Facility group whose planes serve the entire Columbia-Willamette area. Increasing in popularity with reserve pilots attending the University is a stepped-up reserve training program in Eugene. There are 25 members in the Eugene section which hopes to increase its membership to 50.

Naval and Marine Air Corps Reservists at the University who are interested in remaining in the reserve program, earning retirement points, and particularly having the opportunity to fly have been asked to attend a meeting at the Naval-Marine Armory in Eugene at 8 p. m., Apr. 12.

Lt. Thomas L. Burbee, acting commander, explained that naval and marine pilots who join the unit will be able to get in as much flying as they wish. To be eligible for advancement, reservists must earn a minimum of 50 points a year. Points can be earned by attending drills in Eugene and flying in Salem.

Equipment includes a link trainer at the Eugene Armory which will soon be ready to use with trained personnel.

Rules:

Winner will be announced in the Emerald, Monday, Apr. 24, and that date will mark the beginning of the contest for music.

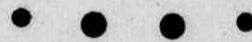
