## National Vice President To Inspect Phi Beta

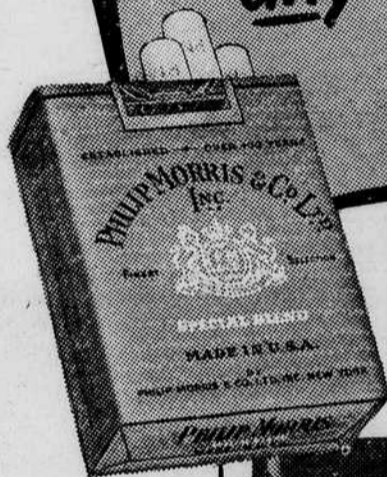
