

Skull & Dagger To Offer Award

A three-term tuition scholarship, amounting to \$127.50, will be awarded to a sophomore male student for the coming school year by Skull and Dagger, sophomore men's service honorary.

To qualify a student must:

(1) Be a male member of the sophomore class, (2) be an Oregon resident, (3) be registered as a regular, resident student in the University, (4) have attended the University for the five previous consecutive terms prior to the term in which he makes application, (5) have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.75 and a previous term minimum of 2.

Application blanks may be secure from the Office of Student Affairs, 201 Emerald, or from Vernon Beard at the Delta Tau Delta.

Completed applications are due to Beard by 5 p.m. Apr. 27.

Official name of the award is the "William Frager Skull and Dagger Memorial Scholarship." A board of judges, consisting of the dean of men, Skull and Dagger adviser, Student Union Director, and Skull and Dagger president, will pick the winner.
