Webfoots Run Circles Around WSC Trackmen As Title Chances Rise

Coach Bill Bowerman's Webfoot cindermen soundly trounced the Washington State Cougars 75½ to 55½ in a dual track meet Saturday on Hayward Field. The Duck victory ended WSC's three-year domination of Northern Division track at 19 consecutive dual meets.

The Oregon triumph paved the way for the Webfoots' first ND dual meet championship since 1934. The Ducks still must meet the Washington Huskies in Eugene on May 6, and Oregon State in Corvallis May 13.

The Ducks won the meet far more convincingly than expected, as they roared out into an early lead and added to their margin with each succeeding event.

Oregon won 10 firsts out of the 14 individual events, and then handed the relay to the visitors by just jogging the circuit in sweatsuits. Bowerman didn't force his relay men to run because cool weather and the slight rain was too conducive to pulled leg muscles.

It was Oregon's first victory over Washington State since 1943.

Mundie Flashes

Surprise Duck wins came in the high hurdles, when Jack Doyle defeated his old adversary, Fran Polsfoot, ND hurdle champion, and in the two-mile, when Pete Mundie won his event easily by turning in the best time of his college career. Mundie's winning time was 9:46, only 3 seconds off the meet record set last year by ougar Dick Paeth.

Other Oregon firsts came in the pole vault, javelin, discus, mile, 440-yard dash, 100-yard dash, 880-yard run, and the 220-yard dash.

George Rasmussen won the pole vault by tying the meet record of 14 feet. Oregon's new event as Don Pickens cleared 13 feet 6 inches and Lloyd Hickok made 13 feet.

Another Oregon sweep came in 100-yard dash as Bill Fell, Al Bulter and Mitch Cleary hit the string in that order. Fell's winning time was :09.8 seconds.

Fell was high point man for Ore-

gon as he added the 220 to his list where he was again followed by Bullier in second place. His time was :21.5 seconds.

Eischen Beaten

In the mile run, Jack Hutchins, running with a bad leg, won the endurance test with Art Backlund taking a close second for the Ducks. Both men easily beat Olympian Clem Eischen, but had trouble edging third placer George Stimac.

Dayey Henthorne took the 440 and Walt McClure, who improves with every race, annexed the 880. Chuck Missfeldt defeated highly regarded Dick Nelson in the javelin, with a 195 foot, 8 inch throw. Earl Stelle took third in this event for Oregon.

Bob Anderson, with the best toss of his collegiate competition, dumped Frank Mataya in the discus event. Anderson's winning throw was 150 feet 9 inches. Dave Earle, promising sophomore, was third.

However, everything was not rosy for the Ducks in the broad jump, where defending ND champion Woodley Lewis went down to defeat to Cougar John Higgins.

Duck Pointmakers

Other pointmakers for Oregon were Jack Countryman, tied for third in 440, Jack Smith, who took second in the low hurdles and tied for second in the high jump, and Dennis Sullivan, third in the low hurdles.

A Cougar sweep came in the shot put. Other visitor blue ribbon winners were Eric Roberts in the high jump, and Fran Polsfoot in the low hurdles.

Oregon will be idle in Northern Division competition this weekend, but Coach Bowerman will take a 440-yard relay team to the Drake relays in Des Moines, Ia. George Rasmussen will go to Provo, Utah, for the State Invitational meet, where he will compete against Bob Richards, former University of Illinois vaulter now performing for the Illinois Athletic Club.

Webfoot Fencers Bow To WSC Crew In Dual Duel

The Washington State College varsity fencing squad captured a 17-4 victory over the University of Oregon physical education class fencers in the west activity court of the Physical Education Building Saturday afternoon.

It was the third victory of the year for the undefeated Cougars, who also have beaten Gonzaga and Idaho.

After the Cougar duelists won the first six matches, the P.E. 190 fencers staged a surprising comeback and took three out of the following seven.

Naito Tops Rittner

The feature event of the afternoon was Duck Captain Al Naito's 5-3 triumph over Captain Vern Rittner of WSC.

Naito collected another win by downing Cougar Bob Williams 5-3. John Ogle, Oregon's No. 4 man, and Ed Conyngham, No. 3, collected the other two Duck victories.

Ogle defeated John Hastie, No. 3 Cougar, 5-4, and Conyngham captured a similar 5-4 win over No. 2 Cougar Bob Williams.

Don Zier, the No. 1 Cougar, was undefeated throughout the afternoon. He won six straight duels, his closest one being a 5-3 win over Naito.

The Duck team also included Roy Peacock, Rex Balentyne, Gerald W. Test, Roland Sunderland, and Tom McDonald.

UO Gridders In for Full Week As Game Set

This is "hell week" for the spring footballers at Oregon, as Head Coach Jim Aiken announced Sunday night that he was planning on five scrimmages this week, the first starting at 3:30 p.m. today.

The rigorous series of practice sessions will be topped off Saturday when Aiken will hold an intra-squad game, which he referred to as "just an informal scrimmage." Moving pictures will be taken of the Saturday game, for the purpose of studying the players, and determining just who is better than whom.

The purpose of the solid week of scrimmage is to enable the coaching staff to break down the varsity eligibles into teams.

Aiken doesn't have many worries in the line, which he reported would be in the neighborhood of 210 pounds per man. With Dave Gibson fortifying the left tackle position, and Dick Patrick holding down center, the forward wall seems secure.

Aiken named Dean Hanson, Emery Barnes, Del Clemens, and Bob Rudolph as probably his most sparkling defensive linemen.

Jake Williams is the "baby" of the line, since he only bends the scales to the 190-pound mark.

The likeable head coach hopes to entangle his backfield problems in time for Saturday's game, when the movies, which do not lie, help him separate the wheat from the chaff.

Tennismen Top Touring Idaho; Title Hopes Up

The unbeaten Oregon varsity tennis team opened its Northern Division conference play with a decisive 6-1 victory over the touring Idaho Vandals on the local courts, Saturday.

The triumph, which saw Coach Coach Robeson Bailey's men drop their first individual match of the year, was the fourth straight decision for Oregon and tabbed them as possible contenders for the title which is being defended by the Washington Huskies.

In singles competition Tom McDonald, the top Duck netter, opened play with a hard, accurate game which gained him a 6-1, 6-1 win over Idaho's Emel Grossberg.

Thom Downs Crane

Cameron Thom followed suit by pinning a 6-1, 6-0 defeat on Jim Crane, number two man for the Vandals.

In a slightly closer contest, Dan Cudahy's forcing game enabled him to thump Idaho's Jack Scull by 6-0, 6-4 scores.

George Boyd clinched the victory for the Ducks when he thumped Hal Barnes, winning by a 6-0, 6-3 margin.

Idaho's only win came in the number four singles match, in which Stewart Dollinger came from behind to hand Bob Mensor a 4-6, 7-5, 6-3 setback.

Ducks Sweep Doubles

The Webfoots captured both of the doubles encounters. MacDonald and Cudahy drubbed Dollinger and Scull in the first one, 6-1, 6-2, while Thom and Bill Williams rounded out the match with a 6-1 6-4 win over Grossberg and Crane.

Oregon faces another busy session this week, traveling to Corvallis to meet the Oregon State Beavers, and playing host to Washington State here on Friday.

Oregon's defensive lineup will see Phil Settecase at first base, Daryle Nelson at second, Ray Coley at shortstop, and Don Kimball at third. The outfield will have Ray Stratton in left, Dick Salter in center, and Chuck Strader in right.

Smith Catching

Jack Smith's defensive ability seems to have earned him the catcher's slot. He is listed as today's starting catcher. Seeking to employ the sorely needed bat of Joe Sugura, Don Kirsch said that he would try to work the big receiver into the outfield.

The importance of this two game series can be seen from the fact that Kirsch spent Friday and Saturday afternoons up in Corvallis watching the Huskies and the Oregon State team tangle. He said that Oregon's foe of today and tomorrow boasts some top flight hitters, as well as a pair of the league's best pitchers.

Kirsch singled out first baseman Bill Andring and third baseman Clyde Glassman as two batters who would figure strongly in the Washington batting attack. Andring hit league pitching for a .455 batting mark last year, while Glassman has inherited the vaunted number four batting slot in his first year as a Husky regular.

Watch for Curves

Curve balls will be the order of the day on the visitor's firing line. Hal Arnason's quick curve sent 27 batters down on strikes during last year's race. Fans will remember left hander Bob Moen as the victor over Oregon in a ball game here last season. Moen throws a big soft curve with enough control to have recorded strikeouts over 21 batters last year. He was the top Dog hurler with a three and one mark. On Saturday he sent seven Beavers out looking at three good pitchers, while walking only two. State batters found him for a scant six hits.

UO Varsity Golfers Trounce Idaho; Clark Sets Course Mark

Coach Sid Milligan's University of Oregon golfers won an easy 22-5 dual meet victory over the Idaho Vandals Friday afternoon. Ron Clark of the Ducks set a new Moscow course record by finishing with a sensational score of 62.

Oregon won four out of six singles matches and took all three doubles events. It was the second triumph of the season for the Ducks, who defeated Oregon State at Corvallis Saturday, April 15.

Although they were slated to meet Washington State at Pullman Saturday, no information on the outcome of that meet has been received.

Oregon Captain Dom Provost and teammate Don Clark plan to enter the Oregon Open Meet at Taulatin today. Clark won the championship last spring.

The next official Oregon meet will be the clash with College of Puget Sound at Eugene May 5. The Ducks will battle the Washington Huskies here on the following day.

University of British Columbia golfers will travel to Eugene for a dual meet May 11, and the second meet of the season with Oregon State will take place two days later, May 13, at the local course.
