

State Board to Consider Problem Of Elementary Teacher Training

The question of expanding elementary teacher training facilities in Oregon again came before the State Board of Higher Education meeting at the Benson Hotel in Portland Monday and today.

A plan for such training at Vanport extension college was presented to the board by Portland Superintendent Paul A. Rehms and Dean J. F. Cramer, extension director. At the request of Board Chairman Edgar Smith, information was given on adding such a course to the Vanport curriculum by co-operation with the Portland schools for practice teaching.

A further proposal made by the organizations of superintendents of schools in first-class cities of the state asked that elementary teacher preparation be added at the University and Oregon State. The superintendents are also in favor

of a general re-shuffle of the whole teacher training set-up in the state by defining the concept of what background a teacher should have.

The state board will be faced with questions of budget, teacher certification standards, and affects of such a change on present colleges of education in considering these proposals.

Regular business at the meeting will include the recommendation of operating budgets for fiscal 1950-51. The board is also expected to take final steps in purchasing 56 acres of land and the administration building at Vanport College after holding a lease from the government for the past two years.

The approval of appointments and acceptance of gifts are scheduled to take place.

Representing the University are President Harry K. Newburn and J. O. Lindstrom, business manager.

Oak Ridge School Positions Open

Specialized training in reactor theory and technology, plus a \$250 or \$300 a month salary, is being offered at the Oak Ridge School of Reactor Technology for the next school year.

Qualifications are an undergraduate degree, major in physics, chemistry, metallurgy, engineering (electrical, chemical, or mechanical), with emphasis on physics, or an advanced degree in scientific research or development; and an outstanding academic record. The engineering candidates must be American citizens and be cleared by the Atomic Energy Commission.

Application blanks are available from the Oak Ridge School of Reactor Technology, Oak Ridge National Laboratory, Post Office Box P, Oak Ridge Tennessee.

These applications, plus personnel security questionnaires, must be in the hands of the committee by May 8. Announcements of acceptance should be out by May 22 or after.
