Four Hits for Nelson; Johnson Goes Today

Pitcher Mel Krause and second baseman Darlye Nelson found out today that two men can't beat nine in a game of baseball, as the Oregon team fell by a 4-2 score to the University of Washington. DeWayne Johnson will have a chance to get even today for Oregon in a game scheduled for 3 o'clock at Howe field.

Krause hurled one of the finest games of his college career,

striking out 12 batters, walking two, and allowing seven hits. Only one run made against him was earned. Infielder Daryle Nelson wielded a potent bat against the excellent slants of Hal Arnason, garnering four of the nine safeties allowed by the righthander. One of his hits went over the left fielder's head for Nelson's first home run of the season.

For four innings, it looked as if that first inning home run was going to be all of today's scoring. Krause pitched steady baseball, getting out of jams in the first two innings by fanning four out of the 11 hitters who faced him in those frames. Arnason showed similar grit, scattering six hits over that span, with only Nelson's hit showing in the run column.

In the fifth inning, with one down, a third strike got by catcher Joe Sugura, allowing Jack Englert to reach base. Bill Andring, the Husky first baseman then sent a long towering blast far over the center fielder's head to bring home two runs. Washington was never headed after that.

Runs on Errors

A two base overthrow by short-stop Ray Coley, followed by a single off the bat of Husky catcher Don Lundberg, stretched the edge to 3-1 in the top of the eighth.

Meanwhile, Arnason's curve was becoming sharper. From the fifth through the seventh innings, only Daryle Nelson's single in the fifth marred his efforts.

It was Daryle again in the eighth that started a flurry by opening the inning with a base blow. When Gordon Roland bobbled his hit to left, Nelson pulled into second base. Dick Salter then advanced him to third, and it appeared as of Oregon had caught fire. Arnason proved that his curve was equal to any conflagration, as he sent the next three hitters down in order, with Nelson coming in on a groundout by Sugura.

More Errors

A second two base error by Coley set Washington up for their final run in the ninth. Rodland singled Arnason home with what proved to be the last run of the day.

In the sixth inning, Don Kirsch sent big Joe Sugura out to play right field. The converted catcher accepted his only chance adequately, giving spectators little chance to compare his form with that of Joe Dimaggio.

Clark Wins

Clark defeated Stan Benjamin of WSC 2-1 while John Prince of the Ducks outstroked Al King 2½-½. Oregon's Jim Donohue blanked Bob Colkigt 3-0, Dave Frey outscored Del Williams 3-0, and Al Riebel won the fifth Duck victory by taking a 3-0 shutout decision over Jack Hill of WSC.

The Ducks are now in first place in the Northern Division dual meet standings. They have won three and lost none and have scored a total of 57½ points while their opponents were tallying only 23½.

The Ducks meet the College of Puget Sound on May 5 and the Washington Huskies on the following day, both meets taking place in Eugene. Ron Clark and Dom Provost of Oregon entered the Oregon Open Meet at Tualatin yesterday morning. Clark is the defending champion.
