

John McCloskey To Head Judges Of Student Libes

John McCloskey, professor of English, has been named chairman of the committee judging undergraduate general libraries in the Library Day contest to be held May 13.

Other chairmen are A. L. Lomax, professor of business administration, judging the undergraduate specialized libraries, and Dr. Chandler Beall, professor of Romance languages, for the graduate library division.

Foskett, associate professor of sociology; and Dr. H. G. Barnett, associate professor of anthropology and assistant curator of anthropology.

(Continued from page one) pate in enforcing rules and regulations which already exist and which otherwise would be administered by members of the faculty.

"This is not a court under the State of Oregon, but only a court under this Association, and as indicated in the clause in question, it will only enforce such rules and discipline as would otherwise be enforced by the faculty.

Experience for Students

"Surely it is good for students to have this experience and to cooperate in University-wide programs," he stated.

The clause these students refer to, Johnson said, was rephrased into its present form by a member of the Law School faculty in order to avoid ambiguity.

Johnson concluded by stating that an appeal on the legality of the court can be addressed to the judiciary committee and appeals on court decisions can be made to the Office of Student Affairs.

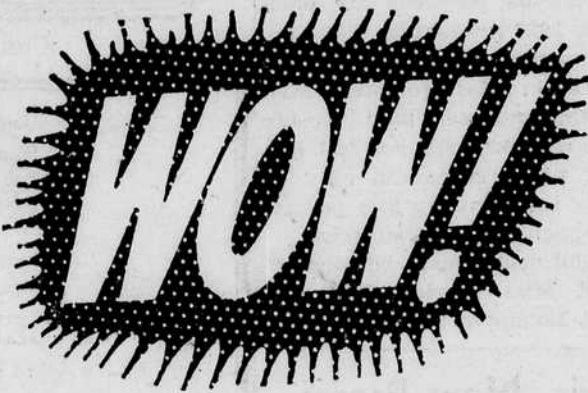
Talk to Feature Jazz
