Department of State Announces Student, Professor Programs

The Department of State has announced four special programs for students, graduates, and professors, according to information received from C. P. Schleicher, professor of political science.

Programs announced were: Department of State Intern Program, United Nations Summer Intern Program at Geneva, Department of State Summer Student Assistant Program, and Professor and Student Seminar on Foreign Affairs.

Webfoot Grad Taken

The purpose of the Department's Intern Program is to select outstanding college graduates for future work with the Department of State. Last year, University student Bob Allen was one of the nation's few college graduates chosen to stay on with the Department.

Students selected for this program will be assigned professional and administrative work in Washington, D.C.

The U.N. Summer Intern Program at Geneva is slated to take place from June 26 to Aug. 18 of this year. Students winning ap-

pointment to this program will be given special work assignments in the Geneva office of the U.N.

Subsistence Given

Unlike the Department of State Intern Program, the U.N. Intern Program will not offer a salary. Instead, students will be given a \$300 subsistence allowance.

The Student Assistant Summer Program will be held in Washington, D.C., and is scheduled to last approximately three months. Student accepted for this will be paid \$9.25 a day and assigned to assisting Departmental officers.

Special research assignments, lectures, discussions, and observational tours will be the key points of the professor and student Summer Seminar on Foreign Affairs to be held also in Washington.

U.N. Intern Program applications are due by May 1; those for the other three program by May 10.
