In 1910, though, the root-er's lid suddenly lost its glamour when the faculty in cahoots with the executive council passed a resolution requiring the freshmen to wear green lids at all times. Now the headgear became a mark of degradation and inferiority.

This ruling was in effect until around 1935—freshmen wore their caps all year until spring term, when a parade was held which ended with a big bonfire into which all the little green marks of degradation and inferiority were tossed, symbolizing the freshmen's newfound freedom.

Nowadays the freshmen wear the lids only under protest during Homecoming and Junior Weekend, and rebellion would probably set in if it were suggested they burn them.

Award Slated For Newspaper Improvement

A new plaque, the Harvey W. Scott award, will be presented by the Oregon Scholastic Press for high school newspaper improvement.

Laurence R. Campbell, professor of journalism and executive secretary of OSP, announced that the award is being presented by the Oregonian in honor of Scott, who was the paper's editor from 1865 to 1910.

Congressman Harris Ellsworth and the Oregon Journal have also donated awards to be presented under the newspaper improvement program of the OSP. The three awards will be presented for the first time at the Oregon high school press conference this fall on the University campus.

Campbell also announced that 27 awards have been added to those given under the recognition program of the OSP. Eighteen Eric W. Allen certificates for newspaper service and 9 George S. Turnbull certificates of yearbook service are presented to high school students who have done outstanding work on student publications.

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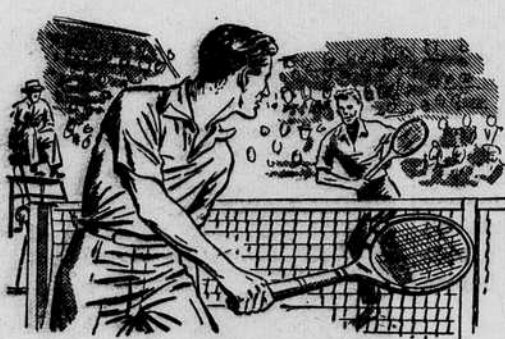
Aluminum Co. Holds Interviews Today

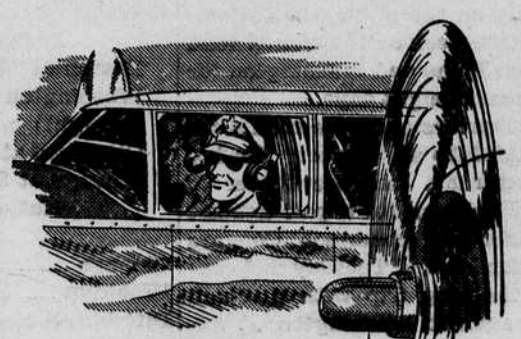
Capt. Paul Buskey, Middlebury, '38 Air Intelligence, U.S. Air Force

He then joined a coated paper mill firm as research and control man. Pearl Harbor changed all that—Paul went to Maxwell Field to begin Aviation Cadet training.



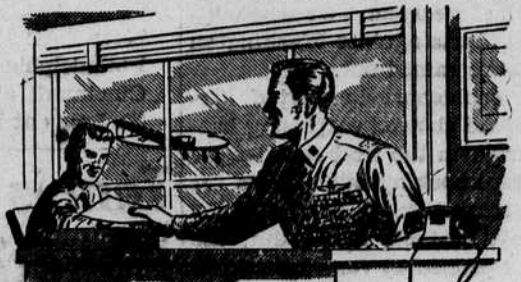
