Pension System, Mule Trains Part Of Korean Life

A Korean farmer can fall right out of his field if he slips while weeding his radish patch.

Ewart M. Baldwin, professor of geology at the University, said he measured the degree of slope on a hill-side tilled by a Korean and found it had a 45 degree angle.

The professor discussed Korea Wednesday night in the library browsing room. Illustrating his Lecture-Forum speech with colored slides, Professor Baldwin noted that Korea, about the size of Utah, has a population of thirty million people. This makes every bit of ground important for farming purposes.

Government Mission

The professor came to the University in 1947. Before then he worked for the Department of Geology and Mining in the state of Oregon. A government mission took him to Korea in 1949 while on official leave of absence from the University.

Seoul, the capital city of Korea, is a modern metropolis of more than one million people, said the professor. He added that the United States Embassy in Korea was one of the largest maintained abroad by the American government.

"This may seem odd at first," he said, "but the fact is that Korea is one of the last outposts against communism we have in that part of the world."

Pension System

The Koreans have a pretty good old-age pension system. When the eldest son in the family is old enough to support his father, the old man retires and smokes a long-stemmed pipe for the rest of his life. The length of the pipe-stem is a measure of his financial status, according to the professor.

John L. Lewis should hear about the wages. A Korean will load up with enough gear to bog down a pack-mule and carry the load from any point in Korea to another point. He gets \$10 per month for playing mule-train.

A 3-month-old child in America could be two years old in Korea if he is born in the latter part of the year. A Korean baby is one year old when born. At the turn of the calendar year he gets another birthday cake. This makes for approximate ages, according to Professor Baldwin.

Professor Baldwin was graduated from Washington State College. He received his doctor's degree from Cornell University.

Co-op membership allows a 10 per cent reduction in cost of food and drinks at the Jumbo Drive-ins, 255 6th ave. E., Eugene, and 705 Main St., Springfield.

Only one membership card is necessary for price reductions for all the persons in a car, Hodge reported.

The drive-ins are open until midnight weekdays, 1 a.m. Fridays, and 2 a.m. Saturdays.

Youth Hostels Plan U.S., Foreign Trips

American Youth Hostel trips will be conducted in this country and abroad again this summer.

Information on the trips, which have been conducted since 1934, may be obtained from Mrs. Annette Harvey, secretary of the School of Health and Physical Education.

Youth hostellers travel throughout 25 countries by bicycle, canoe, skis, horseback, or on foot, staying in simple accommodations called hostels.

This year's trips are scheduled for the United States, Canada, Mexico, Guatemala, Alaska, Hawaii, the British Isles, the Scandinavian countries, France, Germany, the Netherlands, Austria, Switzerland, Belgium, Luxembourg, Italy, and North Africa.
