## IFC Votes to Retain Fall Term Agreement

The Interfraternity Council voted Thursday night to retain the fall-term rushing agreement scheduled to go into effect in September.

The action came as a result of a motion made at an earlier meeting of the IFC this term, when the IFC considered re-opening discussions with Independents with the intention of revising the fall-term rushing setup. Although no vote was taken at the earlier meeting, committees were named to draw up two reports outlining the cases.

The majority report, was adopted last night by a vote of 15 to 6. Also known as the "hands off" policy (after the program in effect at Stanford), the majority report declared that it is the intention of the IFC to do all it can to secure the effectiveness of fall-term rushing as worked out by both the IFC and the Inter-dorm council.

The IFC stated that the success of the program will depend primarily upon the individual houses, and not upon the IFC as a body. The Council declared, however, that should specific houses violate the prohibition against rushing freshmen fall term, the offending house may be prohibited from rushing at all, protecting those houses which abide by the rushing rules. In addition, any freshmen who violate the rushing regulations will be prevented from rushing or pledging.
