

Winner of Saturday Hayward Track Meet Touted For ND Title

The two remaining unbeaten Northern Division track and field squads clash at Hayward Field Saturday when the Oregon Ducks are hosts to Washington's Huskies.

Washington holds easy victories over Oregon State and Idaho while Oregon has romped to wins against Idaho and Washington State. The Duck win over Washington State was the first loss suffered by the Cougars since Washington turned the trick in 1947.

Top Aces To Meet

The meet this Saturday brings together many of the top running aces in the league. Washington and Oregon have at least one man in the Northern Division's top three in every event except the mile and the low hurdles.

The top running attractions for Saturday's meet line up like this:

- 100-yard dash—Bill Fell (O-9.8) vs Craig Weisman (W-9.8)
- 220-yard dash—Bill Fell (O-21.5) vs Craig Weisman (W-21.7)
- 440-yard dash—Dave Henthorne (O-50.0) vs Ken Morgan (W-50.2)
- 880-yard run—Jack Hensey (W-1:53.9) vs Walt McClure (O-1:57.5)
- Two-mile run—George Abbey (W-9:30.8) vs Pete Mundle (O-9:46.8)

High hurdles—Jack Burke (W-14.5) vs Jack Doyle (O-15.1)
Mile relay—Washington (3:23.2) vs Oregon (3:28.3)

In the other running events Washington's Burke is a standout in the low hurdles and Oregon's sensational sophomore has a decided edge in the mile if his injured leg is in shape.

Oregon Has Slight Edge

Oregon has a slight edge in the field events with George Rasmussen favored to lead the Ducks to a possible sweep in the pole vault, Chuck Missfeldt a heavy favorite in the javelin and Bob Anderson leading the discus.

Washington has a winner in the high jump with Bill Olson and the broad jump will be a tossup between Don Bartholemey of Washington and Woodley Lewis of Oregon. Two football players, Loran Perry of Washington and Bob Anderson of Oregon will fight it out in the shot put.

The Ducks had their four-game winning streak snapped by the Washington State Cougars Friday, and will be definite underdogs in today's tussle with the Beavers, who defeated the Cougars Saturday.

The six-man Webfoot traveling crew includes Tom MacDonald, Cameron Thom, Dan Cudahy, Bob Mensor, Bill Williams, and George Boyd. The doubles combinations will be chosen from the preceding group.

The undefeated Beavers, who have a 2-0 mark in conference play, will send several experienced men at the Ducks, including letter-

men Wes Brigham and Bill Huested. The rest of their team includes Don Megale, George Allison, and Ray Thornton.

Meanwhile the Oregon JV's will take on a strong Beaver second varsity at the same time. Most of the Beavers who whitewashed the Willamette varsity Friday are members of the JV's.

The Duck juniors, whose match with Oregon College of Education at Monmouth was postponed yesterday, thus far this season have only a 1-0 record.

The five JV's traveling to Corvallis are Jerry Barde, Fred Zolozzi, Merve Englund, Herb Chin, and Martin Meadows.

Nelson Paces Oregon; Figures Show Eight Hitting in 300 Circle

The Duck gridiron contingent ran through a bruising two and a half hour drill Monday, which stressed defense. Aiken worked his men in sections, with part of them scrimmaging while the remainder worked on plays.

The head man sounded enthusiastic over his forward wall, and was particularly impressed with

the performances of Dan Eldart, 204 pound right tackle from Aberdeen, Wash., and Dean Hanson, 212 pound guard from Beverly Hills, Calif.

Dick Daugherty, Dick Patrick, and Larry Hull, rugged remnants of last year's squad, along with Jake Williams, Boy's Town, Nebr., and Larry Black, Portland, continued to shine in the gruelling practice grinds.

Aiken definitely plans to hold scrimmages Wednesday and Thursday, although there might be some let-up this afternoon.
