'Hamburger Co-op' Membership Sales Slated to End Friday

This is the last week students may purchase membership cards to the "Hamburger Co-op," an association recently established by two University men.

Ken Hodge, senior in business, and Tom Barry, junior in liberal arts, are the instigators of the novel concern which sprang up last week.

Membership in the co-op entitles card-holders to 10 percent off on all food purchased in a Jumbo Drive-in. The drive-ins are located in Eugene and Springfield.

According to Hodge, the pair originally intended to sell membership cards at a booth in the Co-op. Because booth space in the Co-op was taken up for this week, however, Hodge and Barry have arranged for representatives in

each living organization to sell the cards.

When the venture first began, Hodge and Barry sold memberships for \$1. Now that the new business has already started to pay off, the cost to join the co-op has been reduced to 50 cents. Hodge said a refund would be given to those who paid the original \$1 price.

The co-op cards are valid until June 30, 1951 and are being sold only to University and Northwest Christian College students.

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Dance 'Battle' Coming to Park
