Chemistry Department Receives \$2,000 Grant for Atom Study

A \$2,000 research grant was recently received by the University Chemistry Department from the Research Corporation, a New York commercial and educational enterprise.

Work under the grant will deal with linking carbon and hydrogen atoms together. If research is successful, an entirely new structure of atoms will be formed, as well as a new organic compound (a compound containing carbon.)

Success would provide a whole new line of approach toward the manufacture of organic compounds, according to Dr. A. H. Kunz, head of the Department of Chemistry.

V. R. Gaertner, professor of chemistry, suggested the work to the Research Corporation and will supervise University research. Actual work will be done by a student working on his graduate thesis. The student, not named as yet, may be from the University.

Linfield College in McMinnville was the only other Oregon school to receive a grant from the corporation at this time. Thirty-five schools throughout the country received grants.

This is the fourth grant received by the chemistry department within the last three years from the Research Corporation.

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
