

Elaborate Decorations To Depict Prom Theme, 'In a Chinese Garden'

A Oriental atmosphere will prevail at the Junior Prom Saturday night when Charlie Barnet and his 14-piece orchestra move into the Igloo to provide music for the formal dance.

Elaborate decorations for the Prom have been worked out in accordance with the theme "In a Chinese Garden." Colors of yellow, black, and red will be used on the sets for the garden scene, and blue and yellow lighting will be applied to give the setting a realistic appearance.

The band stand will be set up beneath a pagoda on one side of the floor with the theme spelled out in black letters behind the band. In one corner a Chinese garden wall will be depicted with the characteristic round entrance way symbolizing the moon.

Adding to the significance of the set, John Otto and Croxton Delzell, decorations co-chairmen, have provided for replicas of Chinese plum trees to be placed along side each of the separate scenes.

One of the typical Oriental scenes will be a Chinese bridge built against one wall. A backdrop of yellow drapes will be used and the set will be framed with the pink-blossomed plum trees.

Patrons will be comfortably seated in one corner of the Court with a small pagoda of red and yellow as a background. Mothers down for the weekend who are going to attend the Prom will find a place furnished them in the west

balcony of McArthur Court.

Besides the yellow and blue lights that will be used to illuminate the various scenes, four spot lights will be arranged over the middle of the floor.

Working with Delzell and Otto on the decorations are Sub-chairmen Janet Shaw, Bonnie Birke-meier, Shirley Dalton, Geri Ramsey, and Ginny Kellogg.

Faculty Group To Elect Council

Faculty members will elect today at 4 p.m. in 3 Fenton Hall the 1950-51 Advisory Council.

Six members will be named from 18 candidates. The council works with the University president in considering various academic problems.

Voting on four motions presented at the last faculty meeting is also on today's agenda. These include:

1. A motion to change the residence requirement for the bachelor's degree from "45 hours (normally the last 45)" to "45 term hours of the last 60 presented for the degree."

2. A motion to change the requirement concerning hours in upper-division courses for the bachelor's degree from "A minimum of 62 hours, except that only 45 such

hours are required for majors in the professional schools" to "A minimum of 62 hours in upper-division courses."

3. A motion to require an additional 36 term hours of work for a second bachelor's degree, beyond the requirements for the first bachelor's degree.

4. A motion to exclude deans from the advisory Council.
