Beavers Lick Wounds As Hopes End

CORVALLIS—A battered Oregon State baseball team, just back from a disastrous road trip into Washington and Idaho, will go against Oregon this weekend in the initial series of the season between the arch rivals.

The series opener will be here Friday at 3 p.m. with the clubs moving south to Eugene for Saturday's contest. Both teams will wind up their northern division campaign with a return series the following weekend.

Ralph Coleman's sophomore-dominated Orange club dropped six straight games on the road journey to slip from second to a tie for last in the northern division standings. Inability to hit was the Beavers' biggest trouble. In the six games Coleman's men collected only 35 hits on which they managed to score only nine times.

White to Start

Don White, standout sophomore who dropped a pair of pitchers' duels on the trip, undoubtedly will get the call for the Orange Friday. He whipped the Oregon Frosh three times last spring. Big Bud Berg or Rick Ericson, both right handers, probably will be Coleman's mound choice for Saturday.

Other probable starters are Pete Goodbrod, catcher; Bob Christian, first base; Don Fawcett, second base; Leon Akers, third base; Gene Tanselli, shortstop; Ralph Krafe, left field, Bill Harper, center field and Ray Snyder, right field.

Aiken Pleased By Shock Troop Demonstration

In his attempt to build up a sound reservoir of strength, Head Football Coach Jim Aiken scrimmaged his second and third stringers Wednesday at the varsity practice lot, while the top strata worked on plays and punting.

In today's practice, Aiken will hold off the fireworks. Pads will not be in order, and a taper-off is expected after Wednesday's bonerattler.

"We'll have some sort of game Friday," Aiken said, indicating that it would be difficult to get his squad together for a 1:30 drill, since classes will be going full swing. In order not to disappoint the Junior Weekend crowd, however, Aiken and his staff will definitely have a game, complete with moving pictures.

Finale Next Week

The remainder of spring practice sessions, which will leave five for next week, will all be used up in that period. The climax will be the coaches clinic here. The clinic is scheduled to meet May 19, and the fourth annual spring game will be the next day.

For Wednesday's drills, Aiken singled out Larry Black, Bob Rudolph, and Del Clemens as the top performers. He called Black, 206 pound junior, from Grant High in Portland, the best defensive lineman of the day. Rudolph again looked sharp, and Clemens kept up the good football he has been playing all spring.

Ron Lyman, Carson City, Nev., was working at fullback with Hal Dunham, Walla Walla, Wash., handling quarterback chores for the second day. Gene Miner, Eugene, worked out of the left half slot.

Ervin Throwing Weight

Big Carl Ervin, 204 pound sophomore from Corpus Christi, Tex., held down at fullback for the afternoon, and did a fairly devastating job of it. Jerry Shaw, another former Grant High player, who tips the scales at a dainty 252 pounds, turned in a good afternoon at tackle.

Concerning a possible informal scrimmage between the current varsity and the star-studded alumni, the latest reports indicate no soap. There is still some chance that graduated and otherwise departed gridders will consent to take the field and flip and catch a few forward passes, but the whole thing will probably not materialize.

The much-hoped-for game between the alums and the varsity was finally called off yesterday after it was decided that a PCC regulation might suffer an infraction should the two forces collide in public.

Time Trials Underway As Aggie Meet Nears; 440 Relay Team Shines

Oregon track stars continued to cut precious seconds from their best seasonal timings yesterday as Coach Bill Bowerman prepared his crew for their dual meet this Saturday with the Oregon State Beavers in Corvallis.

OSC Sees Small Hope With Ducks

CORVALLIS, Grant Swan's Oregon State track team will host the undefeated Oregon Webfoots on Bell field Saturday afternoon at 1 p.m. in the final dual meet of the season for both squads.

The well-balanced Webfoots, with easy victories over Washington, Wash. State and Idaho, will be heavily favored to trounce the Beavers. Although Swan has some top-notch individuals and the Beavers have not been bested in the field events this spring, the Orange squad lacks the necessary depth to make the meet close.

Some first class individual duels loom. In the mile, Oregon State's Dick Petterson will go against Oregon's sophomore ace, Jack Hutchins, and comparative times indicate a nip and tuck race. In the two-mile, Joe Fisher of the Beavers and Pete Mundle of the Ducks will fight it out with the result a tossup. Oregon will have a big edge in the other running events.

High Hopes for High Jump

Orange Capt. Ken Elliot should have things his own way in the high jump if he comes anywhere near his best mark of 6-4 7/8. Oregon State's standout sophomore pole vaulter, Lyle Dickey, may press Duck star George Rassmussen in bettering the present meet record of 14-2.

Oregon State's Royal Delaney will give Oregon's Chuck Missfeldt plenty of opposition in the javelin. Delaney's best mark this spring is not far behind Missfeldt's 201-3 against Washington. Another tight duel looms in the discus among Len Rinearson and Bob Morse of OSC and Bob Anderson from Oregon.

However, the highlight of the afternoon was the performance of Oregon stellar 440-yard relay team which recently took second in the Drake relays in Des Moines, Iowa. The speedy quartet of Jack Smith, Al Bullier, Dave Henthorne, and Bill Fell ran against a 15-yard handicap and ended in a deadheat with an underling foursome.

They even better the winning time of the Rice Owls in Des Moines by almost a full second. Rice covered the quarter-mile course in 0:42.2 seconds. The Ducks, with Bill Fell running a tremendous last lap, covered the same distance in 0:41.6 seconds.

Fell Flying Faster

Bill Fell again proved himself a powerful runner later in the day as he roared over an 80-yd. course in 0:7.6 seconds which is the equivalent of a 0:9.4 clocking over a full 100-yard course.

Pete Mundle and Walt McClure, Oregon's distance racers, continued toward their peak performances with Mundle pounding the cinders for a mile and half in his top time of 6:59.9. His previous best clocking was 7 minutes and 2 seconds set last Wednesday.

McClure added 40 yards to his regular 660-yard midweek distance and came up with 1:29.9 reading.

Jack Doyle, the Ducks' hurdling ace, hopped the 100-yard high hurdles in 12.4 seconds for his best of the season. Doyle will be competing against his younger brother Jerry, a sophomore at OSC, in the meet Saturday.

Jack Countryman and Phil Jones, running over a 400-yard course, turned in reputable times. Countryman won the race in 0:44.8 seconds while Jones was pounding in his foot steps at 0:44.9.

Other timings were Art Backlund, 3:16.7 in the three-quarter mile, Pell and Henthorne, 0:14.4 in the 150-yard dash, and Mitch Cleary 0:14.5 seconds in the 150.

Field Tests Today

Distance tests in the weight and field events are slated for this afternoon starting at 3 p.m.

Jack Hutchins, sensational sophomore miler, is the only casualty on the squad. He aggravated the leg injury that hampered him all season and didn't compete in yesterday's tests against the clock. He is expected to see action against the Beavers, however.

The Ducks, who have already secured at least a tie for the Northern Division dual meet championship, will be rated top-heavy favorites when they journey to Corvallis to meet the Beavers. Last year the Ducks edged out Coach Grant (Doc) Swan's squad 66-65, but had won the meet before the running of the mile relay.
