

Oregon Golfers Whip UBC for Sixth Win

Led by Medalist Ron Clark, the undefeated University of Oregon golfers crushed the University of British Columbia 15½ to 2½ at the Eugene Country Club yesterday as the Ducks captured their sixth win of the season.

The Ducks won all six matches, taking four singles and two best-ball contests.

Clark carded a low score of 69 as he defeated Doug Bajus of UBC 3-0. Dom Provost and John Prince of Oregon gained similar 3-0 shutout wins over Pete Bartelt and Chuck Swanson, respectively.

Al Riebel completed Oregon's sweep of all of the singles events as he downed Walter Manning 2-1.

Riebel and Clark scored a 66 in best-ball play for the best mark in that division. They outscored Bajus and Bartelt 2-1. The other best-ball match was featured by a win over Swanson and Manning by Provost and Prince, who carded a 68.

Fifth Doubling of Year

The Oregon victory marked the fifth consecutive time that Coach Sid Milligan's talented divoters have doubled the scores of their opponents. The Ducks have now scored 114½ points to a mere 41½ for their six opponents.

Oregon closes the dual meet season Saturday when the Oregon State Beavers travel to Eugene. The Ducks won an easy 16½ to 10½ triumph over OSC earlier this season at Corvallis.

Milligan's men will close the season at Corvallis May 19 and 20 when they enter the Northern Division Meet.

The Oregon Frosh also will see action Saturday, when they will battle the OSC Rooks at Eugene. This will be the second meet of the season for the Frosh, who defeated the Rooks 11-7 at Corvallis for their opening initial 1950 win.

Whites, Greens At 1:30 Today, Hayward Field

Coach Jim Aiken yesterday released his line-ups for today's intra-squad game, and said at the same time that "everybody will play."

Game time is 1:30 p.m.; teams are the Whites vs the Blues; place is Hayward Field. Quarterbacks will be Earl Stelle for the Whites against Hal Dunham for the Green team.

The game will be officiated by two regular Pacific Coast Conference officials from Portland. About 50 players will take part in the contest.

For the White team, the line-up stacks up as:

Ends, Sam Nicolopolus and Dick Daugherty; tackles, Dave Gibson and Gus Knickrem; guards, Don McCaulley and Ray Lung; and center, Bob Rudolph. The White backfield will be Stelle at quarterback, Tom Lyons at right half, Wayne Parsons at left half, and Ron Lyman at fullback.

For the Green team, the squad will be:

Ends, Monte Brethauer and Wayne Johnson; tackles, Gerry Moshofsky and Jerry Shaw; guards, Delmar Clemens and Larry Hull; and center, John Adams. The Green quarterback will be Dunham, Gene Miner will play left half, Darwin Farnsworth will play at right half, and Carl Ervin will take the fullback duties.

Aiken asserted that he will use completely different teams for each squad on defense, and will alternate offensive players regularly. Because of class schedules, some players may not be able to start the game at 1:30 p.m., but the above line-ups will eventually take shape. Movies will be taken of the game.

Webfoots Meet OSC Today At Corvallis; Here Tomorrow

Oregon's improving baseball team opens its last series of the year this afternoon at Corvallis when the Ducks go against the befuddled Beavers of OSC, and to the loser goes the cellar.

The Aggies hold the current lease on the Northern Division's musty basement after a winless search for the Holy Grail in Washington and Idaho.

Oregon, by dividing the wins and losses on a similar trip, rests a few percentage points above Ralph Coleman's men. The Ducks have won four and lost eight, while the Beavers have copped three and dropped seven.

A victory for Don Kirsch's crew could hoist them into third place, ahead of the four-and-seven Idaho Vandals.

Krause to Start

Kirsch plans to start Mel Krause on the mound against the Aggies. Krause will be firing at the plate in hopes of bettering his 2-3 record in conference action. The right hander won his only start against the Beavers last year.

Despite the Ducks' poor record in the win-and-loss column, their artillery has outshelled the opposition in most of the games this season.

The bat of second baseman Darlye Nelson has been making the loudest noise, although he failed to hit in eight trips against Washington at Seattle. Nelson will be boasting a .381 average when he walks up to the plate today.

Ray Stratton is another man who has been putting fear in the hearts of pitchers. The reliable left fielder picked up Nelson's fallen torch in the Husky series and had a lot to do with the Oregon win. Catcher Joe Sugera and outfielder-first baseman Chuck Strader are two more who can pile up the RBIs.

Sophomore Don White is expected to be the first Beaver pitcher to face these men. Rumors around Corvallis have it that Coleman will use a hat to select the chucker to follow White.

Like Uncle Nate, poor plate work has been the downfall of the Beavers. The Orange squad is hitting .258 in 10 contests, with only two of the regulars above the .300 mark. Both are infielders.

Coach Bill Bowerman's Webfoot cindermen didn't complete their weight and distance tests yesterday because of a scheduling conflict with the Oregon Frosh—OSC Rook dual meet which was to be held at 3 p.m.

But the Ducklin-Rook meet failed to materialize when the Baby Beavers didn't show up at meet time. Oregon State Coach Grant (Doc) Swan said the absence of his team was due to a scheduling error. Swan said he thought the meet was slated for May 18 instead of yesterday. The meet has been rescheduled for that day, according to Art Litchman, director of the athletic news bureau.

In the meantime, Bowerman sent his charges through a light workout of baton passing, walking, jogging, and fast starts from the blocks as he added the final touches of perfection to his talented crew before sending them against the Beavers in Corvallis at 1 p.m. Saturday.

New Record Possible

The Ducks will be heavily favored to defeat Doc Swan's aggregation and could possibly run up the largest number of total points ever scored by an Oregon track team.

This year's team already established a new high team score when it defeated the Idaho Vandals 88-43. Previous high record was the 87 1/3 to 43 2/3 score which was compiled against the Beavers in 1935. However, Oregon State holds the record high score between the two schools, a 93-to-38 bulge run up in 1929.

The Oregon-Oregon State meet will be the highlight of the Beavers' "All Sports Day," which will see Orange teams compete in football, baseball, and basketball, besides track.

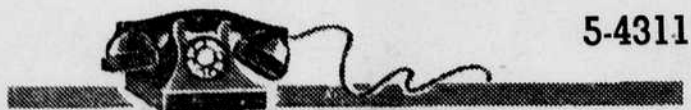
Sigma Chi scored two runs in the third when both Blinkinsopp and Pritchett reached first on errors, and Bircher doubled.
