Don't Laugh at the Tug-o-War, It's Going to be Grimly Real

A grim battle-field element which will threaten contestants in today's Tug-o-War was revealed Thursday by Dr. Squire Bozarth of the Infirmary.

The danger is infection. The muddy stream known as the "storied and romantic" Millrace which will be used as an obstacle for the freshmen - sophomore battle is again "super-polluted," Dr. Bozarth said.

Anyone getting the water in his mouth or nose is inviting a sinus condition — possibly something worse, Dr. Bozarth said.

The source of the Millrace, the Willamette River, has been closed for swimming the past few years by state authorities because of high pollution resulting from sewage dumped into it by Springfield and other cities.

Also, pollution built up in stagnant pools during winter term when the millrace was idle may not be flushed out yet, the Parks and Recreation Department said Thursday.

However, a bright note was added to the situation.

Several hardy souls have endured the cold and scum of the Millrace this week and have not yet contracted severe illnesses, a telephone poll of Millrace living groups revealed.

According to a Junior Weekend official, the pollution will only "add realism to today's battle and will encourage both teams to keep away from the possible danger."
