

DUCK TRACKS

This is intended as a preview of the University of Oregon's 1950 football team. Perhaps some of you saw part of this squad in action yesterday on Hayward Field in the intrasquad game. We say "part of it" because they are several players who didn't participate yesterday that will definitely be in the running next fall.

Among these are Bill Fell, presently sprinting on the track team, Chuck Misfeldt, a javelin tosser for Track Coach Bill Bowerman, and Bob Anderson, who has been working out in spring grid practice but laid off yesterday because of his duties to the discuss in the Oregon State-track meet today in Corvallis.

Fell will without doubt hold down the first string left half-back position next fall. He is called, and rightly so, the fastest man in football. He got this title by beating the Army's Glen Davis in a 100-yard sprint, with both runners dressed in football togs. Davis was formerly recognized as the fastest football player in the nation.

Last fall, Fell was a youngster of 18, and he lacked experience in carrying the ball. He could run, but only around the ends. In his junior college experience, he had no trouble in escaping that defensive end on his long sweeps, but against tougher competition he sometimes got caught.

Fell A Ball Carrier Now

In early spring practices, before he started devoting full time to his track duties, Fell proved that he can smack the line as well as any football player. On quick-opening plays, one of Coach Jim Aiken's specialty plays, Fell has reminded observers of Oregon's famous Jake Leicht.

On one particular afternoon a month or so ago, Fell ran through the entire defensive team for touchdowns the first two times he carried the ball. Both plays put him through quick openings in the line.

Look for Bill Fell to be a standout and a star on next fall's team. We firmly believe he'll deliver.

The Lineups Forthwith

Before we go on to other members of the team individually, let's take a look at what the team as a whole will probably look like. Call this a prediction if you wish. Here's what we think the team will line up next fall:

Left end, Jake Williams; left tackle, Dave Gibson; left guard, Chet Daniels; center, Dick Patrick; right guard, Ray Lung; right tackle, Bob Anderson; right end Dick Daugherty. Earl Stelle will probably put in all his time at the quarterback position. The left half will be Fell, right half will be Darwin Farnsworth, and the fullback spot will be occupied by Misfeldt. That's the offensive team.

On the defense, the line won't change too much, with a few exceptions. For one, Big Emery Barnes will play a standout defensive end position, and he'll be mighty hard to move. Harold Simmons will probably fill in as a defensive tackle.

Bob Rudolph may see defensive line action, and he also looks like a sure bet for a fill-in at offensive center. Monte Brethauer may see some action, also, as will Wayne Johnson.

One big question next fall will be the defensive status of Patrick and Daugherty, the terrific backer-ups of last fall. These two boys could be counted on to make at least half of all tackles during a game.

A Partner Needed

But with both men playing in the offensive line, the double duty of putting in such a bruising defensive duty might make them less valuable. Chances are, however, they will play most of the time, regardless of which team has the ball. Both are rugged and should be able to put in the full time. Brad Ecklund did it.

Dean Hanson will also put in a good deal of time as a line-backer, but Aiken will have to hunt a long time to find a partner for Hanson to make up a pair like Patrick and Daugherty.

Another possible for a defensive tackle is Delmar Clemens, ability to keep fighting in spring workouts.

Gus Knickrem will undoubtedly figure in the tackle situation, but whether he will relieve as an offensive tackle or put in full time on defense we don't know.

In the defensive backfield, look for Bob Carey to play safety. He's been Aiken's favorite for some time in spring drills, and he's our favorite for that position. Halfbacks will be—probably, Ray Karnofski and Jack Gibilisco, providing the latter returns to school, and it seems sure now that he will.
